AN ACT

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1995, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*
3 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
4 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
5 Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September
6 30, 1995, and for other purposes, namely:

1 TITLE I—CONGRESSIONAL OPERATIONS

2 HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

3 PAYMENTS TO WIDOWS AND HEIRS OF DECEASED

4 MEMBERS OF CONGRESS

5 For payment to the estate of William H. Natcher,
6 late a Representative from the Commonwealth of Ken-
7 tucky, \$133,600.

8 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

9 For salaries and expenses of the House of Represent-
10 atives, \$728,468,000, as follows:

11 HOUSE LEADERSHIP OFFICES

12 For salaries and expenses, as authorized by law,
13 \$6,096,000, including: Office of the Speaker, \$1,444,000,
14 including \$25,000 for official expenses of the Speaker; Of-
15 fice of the Majority Floor Leader, \$1,042,000, including
16 \$10,000 for official expenses of the Majority Leader; Of-
17 fice of the Minority Floor Leader, \$1,429,000, including
18 \$10,000 for official expenses of the Minority Leader; Of-
19 fice of the Majority Whip, \$1,284,000, including \$5,000
20 for official expenses of the Majority Whip and not to ex-
21 ceed \$563,000 for the Chief Deputy Majority Whips; and
22 Office of the Minority Whip, \$897,000, including \$5,000
23 for official expenses of the Minority Whip and not to ex-
24 ceed \$104,000 for the Chief Deputy Minority Whip.

1 MEMBERS' CLERK HIRE

2 For staff employed by each Member in the discharge
3 of official and representative duties, \$240,417,000.

4 COMMITTEE EMPLOYEES

5 For professional and clerical employees of standing
6 committees, including the Committee on Appropriations
7 and the Committee on the Budget, \$73,925,000.

8 COMMITTEE ON THE BUDGET (STUDIES)

9 For salaries, expenses, and studies by the Committee
10 on the Budget, and temporary personal services for such
11 committee to be expended in accordance with sections
12 101(c), 606, 703, and 901(e) of the Congressional Budget
13 Act of 1974, and to be available for reimbursement to
14 agencies for services performed, \$401,000.

15 STANDING COMMITTEES, SPECIAL AND SELECT

16 For salaries and expenses of standing committees,
17 special and select, authorized by the House, \$53,191,000.

18 COMMITTEE ON HOUSE ADMINISTRATION

19 HOUSE INFORMATION SYSTEMS

20 For salaries, expenses and temporary personal serv-
21 ices of House Information Systems, under the direction
22 of the Committee on House Administration, \$22,437,000,
23 of which \$16,017,000 is provided herein: *Provided*, That
24 House Information Systems is authorized to receive reim-
25 bursement for services provided from Members of the
26 House of Representatives and other Governmental entities

1 and such reimbursement shall be deposited in the Treas-
2 ury for credit to this account: *Provided further*, That
3 amounts so credited for fiscal year 1994 and not obligated
4 shall be available for obligation in fiscal year 1995.

5 ALLOWANCES AND EXPENSES

6 For allowances and expenses as authorized by House
7 resolution or law, \$244,572,000, including: Official Ex-
8 penses of Members, \$79,800,000; supplies, materials, ad-
9 ministrative costs and Federal tort claims, \$6,103,000;
10 net expenses of purchase, lease and maintenance of office
11 equipment, \$11,779,000; net expenses for telecommuni-
12 cations, \$10,872,000; furniture and furnishings,
13 \$2,012,000; stenographic reporting of committee hearings,
14 \$1,100,000; reemployed annuitants reimbursements,
15 \$1,279,000; Government contributions to employees' life
16 insurance fund, retirement funds, Social Security fund,
17 Medicare fund, health benefits fund, and worker's and un-
18 employment compensation, \$130,849,000; and miscellane-
19 ous items including purchase, exchange, maintenance, re-
20 pair and operation of House motor vehicles,
21 interparliamentary receptions, and gratuities to heirs of
22 deceased employees of the House, \$778,000.

23 CHILD CARE CENTER

24 For salaries and expenses of the House of Represent-
25 atives Child Care Center, such amounts as are deposited
26 in the account established by section 312(d)(1) of the Leg-

1 legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 1992 (40 U.S.C.
2 184g(d)(1)), subject to the level specified in the budget
3 of the Center, as submitted to the Committee on Appro-
4 priations of the House of Representatives.

5 COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS (STUDIES AND
6 INVESTIGATIONS)

7 For salaries and expenses, studies and examinations
8 of executive agencies, by the Committee on Appropria-
9 tions, and temporary personal services for such committee,
10 to be expended in accordance with section 202(b) of the
11 Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946 and to be available
12 for reimbursement to agencies for services performed,
13 \$6,495,000: *Provided*, That the Federal Bureau of Inves-
14 tigation, notwithstanding any other provision of law, may
15 in any fiscal year pay all administrative uncontrollable
16 overtime accrued by its employees while on detail to the
17 Committee on Appropriations.

18 OFFICIAL MAIL COSTS

19 For expenses necessary for official mail costs of the
20 House of Representatives, as authorized by law,
21 \$31,000,000.

22 SALARIES, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

23 For compensation and expenses of officers and em-
24 ployees, as authorized by law, \$56,354,000, including: for
25 salaries and expenses of the Office of the Clerk, including
26 not to exceed \$1,000 for official representation and recep-

1 tion expenses, \$14,158,000; for salaries and expenses of
2 the Office of the Sergeant at Arms, including not to exceed
3 \$500 for official representation and reception expenses,
4 \$1,502,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of the
5 Doorkeeper, including overtime as authorized by law,
6 \$11,506,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of Di-
7 rector of Non-legislative and Financial Services,
8 \$16,360,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of In-
9 spector General, \$295,000; for salaries and expenses of
10 the Office of General Counsel, \$762,000; Office of the
11 Chaplain, \$124,000; Office of the Parliamentarian, includ-
12 ing the Parliamentarian and \$2,000 for preparing the Di-
13 gest of Rules, \$983,000; for salaries and expenses of the
14 Office of the Historian, \$337,000; for salaries and ex-
15 penses of the Office of the Law Revision Counsel of the
16 House, \$1,630,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office
17 of the Legislative Counsel of the House, \$4,400,000; six
18 minority employees, \$747,000; the House Democratic
19 Steering and Policy Committee and the Democratic Cau-
20 cus, \$1,523,000; the House Republican Conference,
21 \$1,523,000; and other authorized employees, \$504,000.

22 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

23 SEC. 101. (a) TRANSFER OF MAJORITY AND MINOR-
24 ITY PRINTERS TO DIRECTOR OF NON-LEGISLATIVE AND
25 FINANCIAL SERVICES.—As soon as practicable, but not

1 later than October 1, 1994, authority over the Majority
2 and Minority Printers of the House of Representatives
3 shall be transferred to the Director of Non-legislative and
4 Financial Services of the House.

5 (b) FEES FOR OFFICES AND UTILITIES.—

6 (1) IN GENERAL.—Upon the transfer required
7 by subsection (a), the Director shall charge the Ma-
8 jority and Minority Printers a reasonable monthly
9 fee for the rental of offices and utilities.

10 (2) AVAILABILITY OF RECEIPTS.—The amounts
11 received under this subsection shall be deposited in
12 the Treasury of the United States for credit to the
13 appropriation for “Salaries and Expenses of the
14 House of Representatives”, and shall be available for
15 expenditure in any fiscal year to the extent provided
16 in appropriations Acts.

17 (c) APPLICABILITY.—This section shall take effect
18 upon the date of the enactment of this Act and shall apply
19 to any fiscal year.

20 JOINT ITEMS

21 For Joint Committees, as follows:

22 JOINT ECONOMIC COMMITTEE

23 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Economic
24 Committee, \$4,090,000, to be disbursed by the Secretary
25 of the Senate.

1 JOINT COMMITTEE ON PRINTING

2 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Committee on
3 Printing, \$1,370,000, to be disbursed by the Secretary of
4 the Senate.

5 JOINT COMMITTEE ON TAXATION

6 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Committee on
7 Taxation, \$6,019,000, to be disbursed by the Clerk of the
8 House.

9 For other joint items, as follows:

10 OFFICE OF THE ATTENDING PHYSICIAN

11 For medical supplies, equipment, and contingent ex-
12 penses of the emergency rooms, and for the Attending
13 Physician and his assistants, including (1) an allowance
14 of \$1,500 per month to the Attending Physician; (2) an
15 allowance of \$500 per month each to two medical officers
16 while on duty in the Attending Physician's office; (3) an
17 allowance of \$500 per month each to two assistants and
18 \$400 per month each not to exceed nine assistants on the
19 basis heretofore provided for such assistance; and (4)
20 \$918,000 for reimbursement to the Department of the
21 Navy for expenses incurred for staff and equipment as-
22 signed to the Office of the Attending Physician, which
23 shall be advanced and credited to the applicable appropria-
24 tion or appropriations from which such salaries, allow-
25 ances, and other expenses are payable and shall be avail-

1 able for all the purposes thereof, \$1,335,000, to be dis-
2 bursed by the Clerk of the House.

3 CAPITOL POLICE BOARD

4 CAPITOL POLICE

5 SALARIES

6 For the Capitol Police Board for salaries, including
7 overtime, and Government contributions to employees'
8 benefits funds, as authorized by law, of officers, members,
9 and employees of the Capitol Police, \$65,991,000, of
10 which \$31,833,000 is provided to the Sergeant at Arms
11 of the House of Representatives, to be disbursed by the
12 Clerk of the House, and \$34,158,000 is provided to the
13 Sergeant at Arms and Doorkeeper of the Senate, to be
14 disbursed by the Secretary of the Senate: *Provided*, That
15 of the amounts appropriated for fiscal year 1995 for sala-
16 ries, including overtime, and Government contributions to
17 employees' benefits funds under this heading, such
18 amounts as may be necessary may be transferred between
19 the Sergeant at Arms of the House of Representatives and
20 the Sergeant at Arms and Doorkeeper of the Senate, upon
21 approval of the Committee on Appropriations of the House
22 of Representatives and the Committee on Appropriations
23 of the Senate.

24 GENERAL EXPENSES

25 For the Capitol Police Board for necessary expenses
26 of the Capitol Police, including motor vehicles, commu-

1 nications and other equipment, uniforms, weapons, sup-
2 plies, materials, training, medical services, the employee
3 assistance program, not more than \$2,000 for the awards
4 program, postage, telephone service, travel advances, relo-
5 cation of instructor and liaison personnel for the Federal
6 Law Enforcement Training Center, and \$85 per month
7 for extra services performed for the Capitol Police Board
8 by an employee of the Sergeant at Arms of the Senate
9 or the House of Representatives designated by the Chair-
10 man of the Board, \$2,000,000, to be disbursed by the
11 Clerk of the House of Representatives: *Provided*, That,
12 notwithstanding any other provision of law, the cost of
13 basic training for the Capitol Police at the Federal Law
14 Enforcement Training Center for fiscal year 1995 shall
15 be paid by the Secretary of the Treasury from funds avail-
16 able to the Department of the Treasury.

17 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

18 SEC. 102. Amounts appropriated for fiscal year 1995
19 for the Capitol Police Board under the heading "CAPITOL
20 POLICE" may be transferred between the headings "SALA-
21 RIES" and "GENERAL EXPENSES", upon approval of the
22 Committees on Appropriations of the Senate and the
23 House of Representatives.

24 CAPITOL GUIDE SERVICE

25 For salaries and expenses of the Capitol Guide Serv-
26 ice, \$1,628,000, to be disbursed by the Secretary of the

1 Senate: *Provided*, That none of these funds shall be used
2 to employ more than thirty-three individuals: *Provided fur-*
3 *ther*, That the Capitol Guide Board is authorized, during
4 emergencies, to employ not more than two additional indi-
5 viduals for not more than one hundred twenty days each,
6 and not more than ten additional individuals for not more
7 than six months each, for the Capitol Guide Service.

8 SPECIAL SERVICES OFFICE

9 For salaries and expenses of the Special Services Of-
10 fice, \$363,000, to be disbursed by the Secretary of the
11 Senate.

12 OFFICE OF TECHNOLOGY ASSESSMENT

13 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

14 For salaries and expenses necessary to carry out the
15 provisions of the Technology Assessment Act of 1972
16 (Public Law 92-484), including official reception and rep-
17 resentation expenses (not to exceed \$5,500 from the Trust
18 Fund), and expenses incurred in administering an em-
19 ployee incentive awards program (not to exceed \$2,500),
20 and rental of space in the District of Columbia,
21 \$21,931,000: *Provided*, That none of the funds in this Act
22 shall be available for salaries or expenses of any employee
23 of the Office of Technology Assessment in excess of 143
24 staff employees: *Provided further*, That no part of this ap-
25 propriation shall be available for assessments or activities

1 not initiated and approved in accordance with section 3(d)
2 of Public Law 92-484: *Provided further*, That none of the
3 funds in this Act shall be available for salaries or expenses
4 of employees of the Office of Technology Assessment in
5 connection with any reimbursable study for which funds
6 are provided from sources other than appropriations made
7 under this Act, or shall be available for any other adminis-
8 trative expenses incurred by the Office of Technology As-
9 sessment in carrying out such a study.

10 CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE

11 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

12 For salaries and expenses necessary to carry out the
13 provisions of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (Pub-
14 lic Law 93-344), including not to exceed \$2,500 to be ex-
15 pended on the certification of the Director of the Congres-
16 sional Budget Office in connection with official representa-
17 tion and reception expenses, \$23,133,000: *Provided*, That
18 none of these funds shall be available for the purchase or
19 hire of a passenger motor vehicle: *Provided further*, That
20 none of the funds in this Act shall be available for salaries
21 or expenses of any employee of the Congressional Budget
22 Office in excess of 221 fulltime equivalent positions: *Pro-*
23 *vided further*, That any sale or lease of property, supplies,
24 or services to the Congressional Budget Office shall be
25 deemed to be a sale or lease of such property, supplies,

1 or services to the Congress subject to section 903 of Public
2 Law 98-63: *Provided further*, That the Director of the
3 Congressional Budget Office shall have the authority,
4 within the limits of available appropriations, to dispose of
5 surplus or obsolete personal property by inter-agency
6 transfer, donation, or discarding.

7 ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL

8 OFFICE OF THE ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL

9 SALARIES

10 For the Architect of the Capitol, the Assistant Archi-
11 tect of the Capitol, and other personal services, at rates
12 of pay provided by law, \$8,927,000.

13 TRAVEL

14 Appropriations under the control of the Architect of
15 the Capitol shall be available for expenses of travel on offi-
16 cial business not to exceed in the aggregate under all
17 funds the sum of \$20,000.

18 CONTINGENT EXPENSES

19 To enable the Architect of the Capitol to make sur-
20 veys and studies, and to meet unforeseen expenses in con-
21 nection with activities under his care, \$100,000, to remain
22 available until expended.

23 CAPITOL BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

24 CAPITOL BUILDINGS

25 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
26 and operation of the Capitol and electrical substations of

1 the Senate and House office buildings, under the jurisdic-
2 tion of the Architect of the Capitol, including furnishings
3 and office equipment; including not to exceed \$1,000 for
4 official reception and representation expenses, to be ex-
5 pended as the Architect of the Capitol may approve; pur-
6 chase or exchange, maintenance and operation of a pas-
7 senger motor vehicle; security installations which are ap-
8 proved by the Capitol Police Board, authorized by House
9 Concurrent Resolution 550, Ninety-Second Congress,
10 agreed to September 19, 1972, the cost limitation of which
11 is hereby further increased by \$200,000; and attendance,
12 when specifically authorized by the Architect of the Cap-
13 itol, at meetings or conventions in connection with subjects
14 related to work under the Architect of the Capitol,
15 \$22,340,000, of which \$2,763,000 shall remain available
16 until expended.

17 CAPITOL GROUNDS

18 For all necessary expenses for care and improvement
19 of grounds surrounding the Capitol, the Senate and House
20 office buildings, and the Capitol Power Plant, \$5,201,000,
21 of which \$25,000 shall remain available until expended.

22 HOUSE OFFICE BUILDINGS

23 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
24 and operation of the House office buildings, including the
25 position of Superintendent of Garages as authorized by

1 law, \$41,364,000, of which \$10,260,000 shall remain
2 available until expended.

3 CAPITOL POWER PLANT

4 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
5 and operation of the Capitol Power Plant; lighting, heat-
6 ing, power (including the purchase of electrical energy)
7 and water and sewer services for the Capitol, Senate and
8 House office buildings, Library of Congress buildings, and
9 the grounds about the same, Botanic Garden, Senate ga-
10 rage, and air conditioning refrigeration not supplied from
11 plants in any of such buildings; heating the Government
12 Printing Office and Washington City Post Office, and
13 heating and chilled water for air conditioning for the Su-
14 preme Court Building, Union Station complex, Thurgood
15 Marshall Federal Judiciary Building and the Folger
16 Shakespeare Library, expenses for which shall be ad-
17 vanced or reimbursed upon request of the Architect of the
18 Capitol and amounts so received shall be deposited into
19 the Treasury to the credit of this appropriation,
20 \$33,342,000, of which \$865,000 shall remain available
21 until expended: *Provided*, That not to exceed \$3,200,000
22 of the funds credited or to be reimbursed to this appro-
23 priation as herein provided shall be available for obligation
24 during fiscal year 1995.

1 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

2 SEC. 103. The matter in chapter III of title I of the
3 Supplemental Appropriations Act, 1975 under “Capitol
4 Buildings and Grounds” under the heading “ARCHI-
5 TECT OF THE CAPITOL” (40 U.S.C. 166b-2) is
6 amended by striking “to grade 11” and inserting “at not
7 to exceed grade 12”.

8 LIBRARY OF CONGRESS

9 CONGRESSIONAL RESEARCH SERVICE

10 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

11 For necessary expenses to carry out the provisions
12 of section 203 of the Legislative Reorganization Act of
13 1946 (2 U.S.C. 166) and to revise and extend the Anno-
14 tated Constitution of the United States of America,
15 \$58,938,000: *Provided*, That no part of this appropriation
16 may be used to pay any salary or expense in connection
17 with any publication, or preparation of material therefor
18 (except the Digest of Public General Bills), to be issued
19 by the Library of Congress unless such publication has
20 obtained prior approval of either the Committee on House
21 Administration of the House of Representatives or the
22 Committee on Rules and Administration of the Senate:
23 *Provided further*, That, notwithstanding any other provi-
24 sion of law, the compensation of the Director of the Con-
25 gressional Research Service, Library of Congress, shall be

1 at an annual rate which is equal to the annual rate of
2 basic pay for positions at level IV of the Executive Sched-
3 ule under section 5315 of title 5, United States Code.

4 GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE

5 CONGRESSIONAL PRINTING AND BINDING

6 For authorized printing and binding for the Congress
7 and the distribution of Congressional information in any
8 format; printing and binding for the Architect of the Cap-
9 itol; expenses necessary for preparing the semimonthly
10 and session index to the Congressional Record, as author-
11 ized by law (44 U.S.C. 902); printing and binding of Gov-
12 ernment publications authorized by law to be distributed
13 to Members of Congress; and printing, binding, and dis-
14 tribution of Government publications authorized by law to
15 be distributed without charge to the recipient,
16 \$87,717,000: *Provided*, That this appropriation shall not
17 be available for printing and binding part 2 of the annual
18 report of the Secretary of Agriculture (known as the Year-
19 book of Agriculture) nor for copies of the permanent edi-
20 tion of the Congressional Record for individual Represent-
21 atives, Resident Commissioners or Delegates authorized
22 under 44 U.S.C. 906: *Provided further*, That this appro-
23 priation shall be available for the payment of obligations
24 incurred under the appropriations for similar purposes for
25 preceding fiscal years.

1 This title may be cited as the “Congressional Oper-
2 ations Appropriations Act, 1995”.

3 TITLE II—OTHER AGENCIES

4 BOTANIC GARDEN

5 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

6 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
7 and operation of the Botanic Garden and the nurseries,
8 buildings, grounds, and collections; and purchase and ex-
9 change, maintenance, repair, and operation of a passenger
10 motor vehicle; all under the direction of the Joint Commit-
11 tee on the Library, \$3,182,000.

12 LIBRARY OF CONGRESS

13 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

14 For necessary expenses of the Library of Congress,
15 not otherwise provided for, including development and
16 maintenance of the Union Catalogs; custody and custodial
17 care of the Library buildings; special clothing; cleaning,
18 laundering and repair of uniforms; preservation of motion
19 pictures in the custody of the Library; operation and
20 maintenance of the American Folklife Center in the Li-
21 brary; preparation and distribution of catalog cards and
22 other publications of the Library; hire or purchase of one
23 passenger motor vehicle; and expenses of the Library of
24 Congress Trust Fund Board not properly chargeable to
25 the income of any trust fund held by the Board,

1 \$207,857,000, of which not more than \$7,869,000 shall
2 be derived from collections credited to this appropriation
3 during fiscal year 1995 under the Act of June 28, 1902
4 (chapter 1301; 32 Stat. 480; 2 U.S.C. 150): *Provided*,
5 That the total amount available for obligation shall be re-
6 duced by the amount by which collections are less than
7 the \$7,869,000: *Provided further*, That of the total
8 amount appropriated, \$8,458,000 is to remain available
9 until expended for acquisition of books, periodicals, and
10 newspapers, and all other materials including subscrip-
11 tions for bibliographic services for the Library, including
12 \$40,000 to be available solely for the purchase, when spe-
13 cifically approved by the Librarian, of special and unique
14 materials for additions to the collections.

15 COPYRIGHT OFFICE

16 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

17 For necessary expenses of the Copyright Office, in-
18 cluding publication of the decisions of the United States
19 courts involving copyrights, \$27,186,000, of which not
20 more than \$14,500,000 shall be derived from collections
21 credited to this appropriation during fiscal year 1995
22 under 17 U.S.C. 708(c), and not more than \$2,891,000
23 shall be derived from collections during fiscal year 1995
24 under 17 U.S.C. 111(d)(2), 119(b)(2), 802(h), and 1005:
25 *Provided*, That the total amount available for obligation

1 shall be reduced by the amount by which collections are
2 less than \$17,391,000: *Provided further*, That up to
3 \$100,000 of the amount appropriated is available for the
4 maintenance of an “International Copyright Institute” in
5 the Copyright Office of the Library of Congress for the
6 purpose of training nationals of developing countries in
7 intellectual property laws and policies: *Provided further*,
8 That not to exceed \$2,250 may be expended on the certifi-
9 cation of the Librarian of Congress or his designee, in con-
10 nection with official representation and reception expenses
11 for activities of the International Copyright Institute.

12 BOOKS FOR THE BLIND AND PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED
13 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

14 For salaries and expenses to carry out the provisions
15 of the Act of March 3, 1931 (chapter 400; 46 Stat. 1487;
16 2 U.S.C. 135a), \$44,622,000, of which \$10,896,000 shall
17 remain available until expended.

18 FURNITURE AND FURNISHINGS

19 For necessary expenses for the purchase and repair
20 of furniture, furnishings, office and library equipment,
21 \$5,825,000, of which \$1,886,000 shall be available until
22 expended only for the purchase and supply of furniture,
23 shelving, furnishings, and related costs necessary for the
24 renovation and restoration of the Thomas Jefferson and
25 John Adams Library buildings.

1 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

2 SEC. 201. Appropriations in this Act available to the
3 Library of Congress shall be available, in an amount not
4 to exceed \$194,290, of which \$58,100 is for the Congres-
5 sional Research Service, when specifically authorized by
6 the Librarian, for attendance at meetings concerned with
7 the function or activity for which the appropriation is
8 made.

9 SEC. 202. (a) No part of the funds appropriated in
10 this Act shall be used by the Library of Congress to ad-
11 minister any flexible or compressed work schedule which—

12 (1) applies to any manager or supervisor in
13 a position the grade or level of which is equal to or
14 higher than GS-15; and

15 (2) grants such manager or supervisor the
16 right to not be at work for all or a portion of a
17 workday because of time worked by the manager or
18 supervisor on another workday.

19 (b) For purposes of this section, the term “manager
20 or supervisor” means any management official or super-
21 visor, as such terms are defined in section 7103(a) (10)
22 and (11) of title 5, United States Code.

23 SEC. 203. Appropriated funds received by the Library
24 of Congress from other Federal agencies to cover general
25 and administrative overhead costs generated by perform-

1 ing reimbursable work for other agencies under the au-
2 thority of 31 U.S.C. 1535 and 1536 shall not be used to
3 employ more than 65 employees and may be expended or
4 obligated—

5 (1) in the case of a reimbursement, only to
6 such extent or in such amounts as are provided in
7 appropriations Acts; or

8 (2) in the case of an advance payment,
9 only—

10 (A) to pay for such general or adminis-
11 trative overhead costs as are attributable to the
12 work performed for such agency; or

13 (B) to such extent or in such amounts
14 as are provided in appropriations Acts, with re-
15 spect to any purpose not allowable under sub-
16 paragraph (A).

17 SEC. 204. Not to exceed \$5,000 of any funds appro-
18 priated to the Library of Congress may be expended, on
19 the certification of the Librarian of Congress, in connec-
20 tion with official representation and reception expenses for
21 the Library of Congress incentive awards program.

22 SEC. 205. Not to exceed \$12,000 of funds appro-
23 priated to the Library of Congress may be expended, on
24 the certification of the Librarian of Congress or his des-

1 ignee, in connection with official representation and recep-
2 tion expenses for the Overseas Field Offices.

3 SEC. 206. Under the heading "Library of Congress"
4 obligational authority shall be available, in an amount not
5 to exceed \$75,236,000 for reimbursable activities,
6 \$8,706,000 for revolving fund activities, and \$6,150,000
7 for non-expenditure transfer activities in support of par-
8 liamentary development during the current fiscal year.

9 ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL

10 LIBRARY BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

11 STRUCTURAL AND MECHANICAL CARE

12 For all necessary expenses for the mechanical and
13 structural maintenance, care and operation of the Library
14 buildings and grounds, \$9,860,000, of which \$941,000
15 shall remain available until expended.

16 GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE

17 OFFICE OF SUPERINTENDENT OF DOCUMENTS

18 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

19 For expenses of the Office of Superintendent of Doc-
20 uments necessary to provide for the cataloging and index-
21 ing of Government publications and their distribution to
22 the public, Members of Congress, other Government agen-
23 cies, and designated depository and international exchange
24 libraries as authorized by law, \$30,600,000: *Provided,*
25 That the objectives of chapter 41 of title 44, United States

1 Code, as enacted by the Government Printing Office Elec-
2 tronic Information Access Enhancement Act of 1993, shall
3 be carried out through cost savings: *Provided further*, That
4 travel expenses, including travel expenses of the Deposi-
5 tory Library Council to the Public Printer, shall not ex-
6 ceed \$130,000: *Provided further*, That funds, not to exceed
7 \$2,000,000, from current year appropriations are author-
8 ized for producing and disseminating Congressional Serial
9 Sets and other related Congressional/non-Congressional
10 publications for 1993 and 1994 to depository and other
11 designated libraries.

12 GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE REVOLVING FUND

13 The Government Printing Office is hereby authorized
14 to make such expenditures, within the limits of funds
15 available and in accord with the law, and to make such
16 contracts and commitments without regard to fiscal year
17 limitations as provided by section 104 of the Government
18 Corporation Control Act as may be necessary in carrying
19 out the programs and purposes set forth in the budget
20 for the current fiscal year for the "Government Printing
21 Office revolving fund": *Provided*, That not to exceed
22 \$2,500 may be expended on the certification of the Public
23 Printer in connection with official representation and re-
24 ception expenses: *Provided further*, That the revolving
25 fund shall be available for the hire or purchase of pas-

1 senger motor vehicles, not to exceed a fleet of twelve: *Pro-*
2 *vided further*, That expenditures in connection with travel
3 expenses of the advisory councils to the Public Printer
4 shall be deemed necessary to carry out the provisions of
5 title 44, United States Code: *Provided further*, That the
6 revolving fund shall be available for services as authorized
7 by 5 U.S.C. 3109 but at rates for individuals not to exceed
8 the per diem rate equivalent to the rate for level V of the
9 Executive Schedule (5 U.S.C. 5316): *Provided further*,
10 That the revolving fund and the funds provided under the
11 paragraph entitled “OFFICE OF SUPERINTENDENT OF
12 DOCUMENTS, SALARIES AND EXPENSES” together may not
13 be available for the full-time equivalent employment of
14 more than 4,193 workyears: *Provided further*, That the re-
15 volving fund shall be available for expenses not to exceed
16 \$500,000 for the development of plans and design of a
17 multi-purpose facility: *Provided further*, That activities fi-
18 nanced through the revolving fund may provide informa-
19 tion in any format: *Provided further*, That the revolving
20 fund shall not be used to administer any flexible or com-
21 pressed work schedule which applies to any manager or
22 supervisor in a position the grade or level of which is equal
23 to or higher than GS-15: *Provided further*, That expenses
24 for attendance at meetings shall not exceed \$75,000.

1 GENERAL ACCOUNTING OFFICE

2 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

3 For necessary expenses of the General Accounting
4 Office, including not to exceed \$7,000 to be expended on
5 the certification of the Comptroller General of the United
6 States in connection with official representation and recep-
7 tion expenses; services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109 but
8 at rates for individuals not to exceed the per diem rate
9 equivalent to the rate for level IV of the Executive Sched-
10 ule (5 U.S.C. 5315); hire of one passenger motor vehicle;
11 advance payments in foreign countries in accordance with
12 31 U.S.C. 3324; benefits comparable to those payable
13 under sections 901(5), 901(6) and 901(8) of the Foreign
14 Service Act of 1980 (22 U.S.C. 4081(5), 4081(6) and
15 4081(8)); and under regulations prescribed by the Comp-
16 troller General of the United States, rental of living quar-
17 ters in foreign countries and travel benefits comparable
18 with those which are now or hereafter may be granted sin-
19 gle employees of the Agency for International Develop-
20 ment, including single Foreign Service personnel assigned
21 to AID projects, by the Administrator of the Agency for
22 International Development—or his designee—under the
23 authority of section 636(b) of the Foreign Assistance Act
24 of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2396(b)); \$439,525,000: *Provided*,
25 That not more than \$1,000,000 of reimbursements re-

1 ceived incident to the operation of the General Accounting
2 Office Building shall be available for use in fiscal year
3 1995: *Provided further*, That this appropriation and ap-
4 propriations for administrative expenses of any other de-
5 partment or agency which is a member of the Joint Finan-
6 cial Management Improvement Program (JFMIP) shall be
7 available to finance an appropriate share of JFMIP costs
8 as determined by the JFMIP, including the salary of the
9 Executive Director and secretarial support: *Provided fur-*
10 *ther*, That this appropriation and appropriations for ad-
11 ministrative expenses of any other department or agency
12 which is a member of the National Intergovernmental
13 Audit Forum or a Regional Intergovernmental Audit
14 Forum shall be available to finance an appropriate share
15 of Forum costs as determined by the Forum, including
16 necessary travel expenses of non-Federal participants.
17 Payments hereunder to either the Forum or the JFMIP
18 may be credited as reimbursements to any appropriation
19 from which costs involved are initially financed: *Provided*
20 *further*, That to the extent that funds are otherwise avail-
21 able for obligation, agreements or contracts for the re-
22 moval of asbestos, and renovation of the building and
23 building systems (including the heating, ventilation and
24 air conditioning system, electrical system and other major
25 building systems) of the General Accounting Office Build-

1 ing may be made for periods not exceeding five years: *Pro-*
2 *vided further,* That this appropriation and appropriations
3 for administrative expenses of any other department or
4 agency which is a member of the American Consortium
5 on International Public Administration (ACIPA) shall be
6 available to finance an appropriate share of ACIPA costs
7 as determined by the ACIPA, including any expenses at-
8 tributable to membership of ACIPA in the International
9 Institute of Administrative Sciences.

10 TITLE III—GENERAL PROVISIONS

11 SEC. 301. No part of the funds appropriated in this
12 Act shall be used for the maintenance or care of private
13 vehicles, except for emergency assistance and cleaning as
14 may be provided under regulations relating to parking fa-
15 cilities for the House of Representatives issued by the
16 Committee on House Administration and for the Senate
17 issued by the Committee on Rules and Administration.

18 SEC. 302. No part of any appropriation contained in
19 this Act shall remain available for obligation beyond the
20 current fiscal year unless expressly so provided herein.

21 SEC. 303. Whenever any office or position not specifi-
22 cally established by the Legislative Pay Act of 1929 is ap-
23 propriated for herein or whenever the rate of compensa-
24 tion or designation of any position appropriated for herein
25 is different from that specifically established for such posi-

1 tion by such Act, the rate of compensation and the des-
2 ignation of the position, or either, appropriated for or pro-
3 vided herein, shall be the permanent law with respect
4 thereto: *Provided*, That the provisions herein for the var-
5 ious items of official expenses of Members, officers, and
6 committees of the Senate and House of Representatives,
7 and clerk hire for Senators and Members of the House
8 of Representatives shall be the permanent law with respect
9 thereto.

10 SEC. 304. The expenditure of any appropriation
11 under this Act for any consulting service through procure-
12 ment contract, pursuant to 5 U.S.C. 3109, shall be limited
13 to those contracts where such expenditures are a matter
14 of public record and available for public inspection, except
15 where otherwise provided under existing law, or under ex-
16 isting Executive order issued pursuant to existing law.

17 SEC. 305. The last sentence of section 307(a) of the
18 Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 1994 (2 U.S.C.
19 60–1 note) is repealed.

20 SEC. 306. Annual and sick leave balances of employ-
21 ees transferred from the Office of the Director of Non-
22 legislative and Financial Services, House Postal Oper-
23 ations, to the Architect of the Capitol, as of October 31,
24 1993, shall be credited to the leave accounts of such per-
25 sonnel, subject to the provisions of section 6304 of title

1 5, United States Code, upon their transfer to the appro-
2 priation for House office buildings.

3 SEC. 307. (a) CIVIL SERVICE RETIREMENT SYS-
4 TEM.—The first sentence of section 8335(d) of title 5,
5 United States Code, is amended by striking “55” and in-
6 serting “57”.

7 (b) FEDERAL EMPLOYEES’ RETIREMENT SYSTEM.—
8 (1) Section 8425 of title 5, United States Code, is amend-
9 ed—

10 (A) in the first sentence of subsection (b) by
11 striking “member of the Capitol Police or” and
12 “member or”;

13 (B) by redesignating subsection (c) as sub-
14 section (d); and

15 (C) by inserting after subsection (b) the follow-
16 ing:

17 “(c) A member of the Capitol Police who is otherwise
18 eligible for immediate retirement under section 8412(d)
19 shall be separated from the service on the last day of the
20 month in which such member becomes 57 years of age
21 or completes 20 years of service if then over that age. The
22 Capitol Police Board, when in its judgment the public in-
23 terest so requires, may exempt such a member from auto-
24 matic separation under this subsection until that member
25 becomes 60 years of age. The Board shall notify the mem-

1 ber in writing of the date of separation at least 60 days
2 before that date. Action to separate the member if not ef-
3 fective, without the consent of the member, until the last
4 day of the month in which the 60-day notice expires.”.

5 (2) Section 8415(d) of title 5, United States Code,
6 is amended by striking “(a) or (b)” and inserting “(a),
7 (b), or (c)”.

8 SEC. 308. (a) PURCHASE OF AMERICAN-MADE
9 EQUIPMENT AND PRODUCTS.—It is the sense of the Con-
10 gress that, to the greatest extent practicable, all equip-
11 ment and products purchased with funds made available
12 in this Act should be American-made.

13 (b) NOTICE TO GRANTEES AND CONTRACTORS.—In
14 providing financial assistance to, or entering into any con-
15 tract with, any entity using funds made available in this
16 Act, the head of each Federal agency, to the greatest ex-
17 tent practicable, shall provide to such entity a notice de-
18 scribing the statement made in subsection (a) by the Con-
19 gress.

1 This Act may be cited as the “Legislative Branch Ap-
2 propriations Act, 1995”.
