Designating January 16, 1995, as “National Good Teen Day”.

IN THE SENATE OF THE UNITED STATES

JULY 1 (legislative day, JUNE 7), 1994

Mr. GLENN introduced the following joint resolution; which was read twice
and referred to the Committee on the Judiciary

JOINT RESOLUTION

Designating January 16, 1995, as “National Good Teen
Day”.

Whereas the Salem City Schools in Salem, Ohio, have pro-
claimed January 16, 1992, as “Good Teen Day”;

Whereas both the Congress and the President have pro-
claimed January 16, 1993, and January 16, 1994, as
“National Good Teen Day”;

Whereas there are more than 24,000,000 teenagers in the
United States according to the 1990 census;

Whereas our Nation’s teenagers represent an important part
of our society, and the many physical and emotional
changes and character-building experiences which teen-
agers go through are an important concern to society;

Whereas it is easy to stereotype teenagers as either those who
have problems or those who excel;

Whereas teenagers should not simply be recognized for their intelligence, abilities, skills, and talents, but also for the good which is inherent in all human beings;

Whereas teenagers are unique individuals, and should be encouraged to develop the good as well as the potential for growth and future success that is within each of them;

Whereas a day should be set aside to focus on the positive qualities of America's youth; and

Whereas teenagers are the future of this great country: Now, therefore, be it

1 *Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives*
2 *of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*
3 That January 16, 1995, is designated "National Good
4 Teen Day", and the President is authorized and requested
5 to issue a proclamation calling on the people of the United
6 States to observe that day by recognizing the teenagers
7 of the United States and by participating in appropriate
8 ceremonies and activities.

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
