# H. R. 1243

To require the President to notify the Congress of certain arms sales to Saudi Arabia until certain outstanding commercial disputes between United States nationals and the Government of Saudi Arabia are resolved.

Mr. ANDREWS (for himself and Mr. DEUTSCH) introduced the following bill;  
which was referred to the Committee on International Relations

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## A BILL

To require the President to notify the Congress of certain arms sales to Saudi Arabia until certain outstanding commercial disputes between United States nationals and the Government of Saudi Arabia are resolved.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. NOTIFICATION OF ARMS SALES.**

4       Until the certification under section 2 is submitted  
5 to the Congress, section 36(b)(1) of the Arms Export Con-  
6 trol Act shall be applied to sales to Saudi Arabia by sub-  
7 stituting in the first sentence “\$10,000,000” for

1 “\$50,000,000”, “\$50,000,000” for “\$200,000,000”, and  
2 “\$2,000,000” for “\$14,000,000”.

3 **SEC. 2. CERTIFICATION.**

4 Section 1 shall cease to apply if and when the Sec-  
5 retary of State certifies and reports in writing to the Con-  
6 gress that the unpaid claims of American firms against  
7 the Government of Saudi Arabia that—

8 (1) are described in the June 30, 1993, report  
9 by the Secretary of Defense pursuant to section  
10 9140(c) of the Department of Defense Appropria-  
11 tions Act, 1993 (Public Law 102–396; 106 Stat.  
12 1939), or

13 (2) are otherwise outstanding before the date of  
14 the enactment of this Act and have been litigated  
15 fully in the courts of Saudi Arabia but in the opin-  
16 ion of the Secretary of State have not been resolved  
17 in accordance with standards of fairness as deter-  
18 mined by the Secretary of State,

19 including the additional claims noticed by the Department  
20 of Commerce on page 2 of that report, have been resolved  
21 satisfactorily.

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
