Mr. DIAZ-BALART introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means

## A BILL

To prohibit the importation into the United States of sugar from countries that import sugar from Cuba.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. PROHIBITION.**

4 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, sugars,  
5 syrups, and molasses, that are the product of a country  
6 that the President determines has imported sugar, syrup,  
7 or molasses that is the product of Cuba, shall be entered,  
8 or withdrawn from warehouse for consumption, into the  
9 customs territory of the United States, unless the condi-  
10 tion set forth in section 2 is met.

1 **SEC. 2. CONDITION FOR REMOVAL OF PROHIBITION.**

2       The prohibition set forth in section 1 shall cease to  
3 apply to a country if the country certifies to the President  
4 that the country will not import sugar, syrup, or molasses  
5 that is the product of Cuba until free and fair elections,  
6 conducted under the supervision of internationally recog-  
7 nized observers, are held in Cuba. Such certification shall  
8 cease to be effective if the President makes a subsequent  
9 determination under section 1 with respect to that coun-  
10 try.

11 **SEC. 3. REPORTS TO CONGRESS.**

12       The President shall report to the Congress all deter-  
13 minations made under section 1 and all certifications  
14 made under section 2.

15 **SEC. 4. REALLOCATION OF SUGAR QUOTAS.**

16       During any period in which a prohibition under sec-  
17 tion 1 is in effect with respect to a country, the President  
18 may reallocate to other countries the quota of sugars, syr-  
19 ups, and molasses allocated to that country, before the  
20 prohibition went into effect, under chapter 17 of the Har-  
21 monized Tariff Schedule of the United States.
