AN ACT

To amend the National Narcotics Leadership Act of 1988 to extend the authorization for the Office of National Drug Control Policy until September 30, 1999, to expand the responsibilities and powers of the Director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; AMENDMENT REFERENCES.**

4 (a) **SHORT TITLE.**—This Act may be cited as the
5 “National Narcotics Leadership Act Amendments of
6 1997”.

7 (b) **AMENDMENT REFERENCES.**—Except as other-
8 wise expressly provided, whenever in this Act an amend-
9 ment or repeal is expressed in terms of an amendment
10 to, or repeal of, a section or other provision, the reference
11 shall be considered to be made to a section or other provi-
12 sion of the National Narcotics Leadership Act of 1988 (21
13 U.S.C. 1501 et seq.).

14 **SEC. 2. DEPUTY DIRECTORS.**

15 (a) **ESTABLISHMENT.**—Section 1002 (21 U.S.C.
16 1501) is amended—

17 (1) in subsection (b)—

18 (A) by amending paragraph (2) to read as

19 follows:

20 “(2) There shall be in the Office of National Drug
21 Control Policy a Deputy Director of the Office of National
22 Drug Control Policy, a Deputy Director for Demand Re-
23 duction, a Deputy Director for Supply Reduction, a Dep-
24 uty Director for State and Local Affairs, and a Deputy
25 Director of Intelligence.”; and

1 (B) by amending paragraph (3) to read as
2 follows:

3 “(3) The Deputy Director of the Office of National
4 Drug Control Policy, the Deputy Director for Demand Re-
5 duction, the Deputy Director for Supply Reduction, the
6 Deputy Director for State and Local Affairs, and the Dep-
7 uty Director of Intelligence shall assist the Director in car-
8 rying out the responsibilities of the Director under this
9 Act.”; and

10 (2) by amending subsection (c)(2) to read as
11 follows:

12 “(2) The Deputy Director for State and Local Affairs
13 shall be the head of the Bureau of State and Local Af-
14 fairs.”.

15 (b) APPOINTMENT.—

16 (1) IN GENERAL.—Section 1003(a) (21 U.S.C.
17 1502(a)) is amended—

18 (A) in each of paragraphs (1) and (2), by
19 inserting “the Deputy Director of the Office of
20 National Drug Control Policy,” after “The Di-
21 rector,”;

22 (B) in each of paragraphs (1) and (2), by
23 striking “and the Associate Director for Na-
24 tional Drug Control Policy” and inserting “the

1 Deputy Director for State and Local Affairs,
2 and the Deputy Director of Intelligence”; and

3 (C) in paragraph (2), by striking “, a Dep-
4 uty Director, or Associate Director” and insert-
5 ing “or as a Deputy Director”.

6 (2) DEADLINE FOR NOMINATION.—The Presi-
7 dent shall submit to the Senate nominations of indi-
8 viduals for appointment as the Deputy Director of
9 the Office of National Drug Control Policy, the Dep-
10 uty Director for Demand Reduction, the Deputy Di-
11 rector for Supply Reduction, the Deputy Director for
12 State and Local Affairs, and the Deputy Director of
13 Intelligence of the Office of National Drug Control
14 Policy by not later than 90 days after the date of
15 the enactment of this Act.

16 (3) CONTINUED SERVICE OF ASSOCIATE DIREC-
17 TOR.—The individual serving on the date of the en-
18 actment of this Act as Associate Director for Na-
19 tional Drug Control Policy may act as the Deputy
20 Director for State and Local Affairs until such time
21 as an individual is appointed to that position in ac-
22 cordance with the amendments made by this Act.

23 (4) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The heading of
24 section 1003 (21 U.S.C. 1502) is amended to read
25 as follows:

1 **“SEC. 1003. APPOINTMENT AND DUTIES OF DIRECTOR AND**
2 **DEPUTY DIRECTORS.”.**

3 (c) COMPENSATION.—

4 (1) IN GENERAL.—Chapter 53 of title 5, United
5 States Code, is amended—

6 (A) in section 5314, by inserting after the
7 item relating to the Deputy Director for Supply
8 Reduction, Office of National Drug Control
9 Policy, the following:

10 “Deputy Director for State and Local Affairs,
11 Office of National Drug Control Policy.

12 “Deputy Director of Intelligence, Office of Na-
13 tional Drug Control Policy.”;

14 (B) in section 5313, by adding at the end
15 the following:

16 “Deputy Director of the Office of National
17 Drug Control Policy.”; and

18 (C) in section 5315, by striking the item
19 relating to the Associate Director for National
20 Drug Control Policy, Office of National Drug
21 Control Policy.

22 (2) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—Section 1003(a)
23 (21 U.S.C. 1502(a)) is amended by striking para-
24 graph (4)(C).

1 **SEC. 3. EXPANSION OF RESPONSIBILITIES OF DIRECTOR.**

2 (a) EXPANSION OF RESPONSIBILITIES.—Section
3 1003(b) (21 U.S.C. 1502(b)) is amended—

4 (1) by amending paragraph (1) to read as fol-
5 lows:

6 “(1) establish Federal policies, objectives, goals,
7 priorities, and performance measures (including spe-
8 cific annual agency targets expressed in terms of
9 precise percentages) for the National Drug Control
10 Program and for each National Drug Control Pro-
11 gram agency, which include targets for the following:

12 “(A) reduction of unlawful drug use to 3
13 percent of the population of the United States
14 or less by December 31, 2001 (as measured in
15 terms of overall illicit drug use during the past
16 30 days by the National Household Survey),
17 and achievement of at least 25 percent of such
18 reduction during each of 1998, 1999, 2000, and
19 2001;

20 “(B) reduction of adolescent unlawful drug
21 use (as measured in terms of illicit drug use
22 during the past 30 days by the Monitoring the
23 Future Survey of the University of Michigan or
24 the National PRIDE Survey conducted by the
25 National Parents’ Resource Institute for Drug
26 Education) to 3 percent of the adolescent popu-

1 lation of the United States or less by December
2 31, 2001, and achievement of at least 25 per-
3 cent of such reduction during each of 1998,
4 1999, 2000, and 2001;

5 “(C) reduction of the availability of co-
6 caine, heroin, marijuana, and methamphet-
7 amine in the United States by 80 percent by
8 December 31, 2001;

9 “(D) reduction of the respective nationwide
10 average street purity levels for cocaine, heroin,
11 marijuana, and methamphetamine (as esti-
12 mated by the interagency drug flows assessment
13 led by the Office of National Drug Control Pol-
14 icy, and based on statistics collected by the
15 Drug Enforcement Administration and other
16 National Drug Control Program agencies iden-
17 tified as relevant by the Director) by 60 percent
18 by December 31, 2001, and achievement of at
19 least 25 percent of each such reduction during
20 each of 1998, 1999, 2000, and 2001;

21 “(E) reduction of drug-related crime in the
22 United States by 50 percent by December 31,
23 2001, and achievement of at least 25 percent of
24 such reduction during each of 1998, 1999,
25 2000, and 2001, including—

1 “(i) reduction of State and Federal
2 unlawful drug trafficking and distribution;

3 “(ii) reduction of State and Federal
4 crimes committed by persons under the in-
5 fluence of unlawful drugs; and

6 “(iii) reduction of State and Federal
7 crimes committed for the purpose of ob-
8 taining unlawful drugs or obtaining prop-
9 erty that is intended to be used for the
10 purchase of unlawful drugs; and

11 “(F) reduction of drug-related emergency
12 room incidents in the United States (as meas-
13 ured by data of the Drug Abuse Warning Net-
14 work on illicit drug abuse), including incidents
15 involving gunshot wounds and automobile acci-
16 dents in which illicit drugs are identified in the
17 bloodstream of the victim, by 50 percent by De-
18 cember 31, 2001;”;

19 (2) by amending paragraph (3) to read as fol-
20 lows:

21 “(3) coordinate, oversee, and evaluate the effec-
22 tiveness of the implementation of the policies, objec-
23 tives, goals, performance measures, and priorities es-
24 tablished under paragraph (1) and the fulfillment of
25 the responsibilities of the National Drug Control

1 Program agencies under the National Drug Control
2 Strategy;”;

3 (3) in paragraph (5), by inserting “and non-
4 governmental entities involved in demand reduction”
5 after “governments”;

6 (4) by striking “and” at the end of paragraph
7 (7);

8 (5) by striking the period at the end of para-
9 graph (8) and inserting a semicolon; and

10 (6) by adding at the end the following new
11 paragraphs:

12 “(9) require each National Drug Control Pro-
13 gram agency to submit to the Director on a semi-
14 annual basis (beginning with the first 6 months of
15 1998) an evaluation of progress by the agency with
16 respect to drug control program goals using the per-
17 formance measures referred to in paragraph (1), in-
18 cluding progress with respect to—

19 “(A) success in reducing domestic and for-
20 eign sources of illegal drugs;

21 “(B) success in protecting the borders of
22 the United States (and in particular the South-
23 western border of the United States) from pen-
24 etration by illegal narcotics;

1 “(C) success in reducing violent crime as-
2 sociated with drug use in the United States;

3 “(D) success in reducing the negative
4 health and social consequences of drug use in
5 the United States; and

6 “(E) implementation of drug treatment
7 and prevention programs in the United States
8 and improvements in the adequacy and effec-
9 tiveness of such programs;

10 “(10) submit to Congress on a semi-annual
11 basis, not later than 60 days after the date of the
12 last day of the applicable 6-month period, a sum-
13 mary of—

14 “(A) each of the evaluations received by
15 the Director under paragraph (9); and

16 “(B) the progress of each National Drug
17 Control Program agency toward the drug con-
18 trol program goals of the agency using the per-
19 formance measures described in paragraph (1);

20 “(11) require the National Drug Control Pro-
21 gram agencies to submit to the Director not later
22 than February 1 of each year a detailed accounting
23 of all funds expended by the agencies for National
24 Drug Control Program activities during the previous
25 fiscal year, and require such accounting to be au-

1 thenticated by the Inspector General for each agency
2 prior to submission to the Director;

3 “(12) submit to Congress not later than April
4 1 of each year the information submitted to the Di-
5 rector under paragraph (11);

6 “(13) submit to Congress not later than August
7 1 of each year a report including—

8 “(A) the budget guidance provided by the
9 Director to each National Drug Control Pro-
10 gram agency for the fiscal year in which the re-
11 port is submitted and for the other fiscal years
12 within the applicable five-year budget plan re-
13 lating to such fiscal year; and

14 “(B) a summary of the request of each
15 National Drug Control Program agency to the
16 Director under this Act (prior to review of the
17 request by the Office of Management and
18 Budget) for the resources required to achieve
19 the targets of the agency under this Act;

20 “(14) act as a representative of the President
21 before Congress on all aspects of the National Drug
22 Control Program;

23 “(15) act as the primary spokesperson of the
24 President on drug issues;

1 “(16) make recommendations to National Drug
2 Control Program agency heads with respect to im-
3 plementation of Federal counter-drug programs;

4 “(17) take such actions as necessary to oppose
5 any attempt to legalize the use of a substance (in
6 any form) that—

7 “(A) is listed in schedule I of section 202
8 of the Controlled Substances Act (21 U.S.C.
9 812); and

10 “(B) has not been approved for use for
11 medical purposes by the Food and Drug Ad-
12 ministration; and

13 “(18) ensure that drug prevention and drug
14 treatment research and information is effectively dis-
15 seminated by National Drug Control Program agen-
16 cies to State and local governments and nongovern-
17 mental entities involved in demand reduction by—

18 “(A) encouraging formal consultation be-
19 tween any such agency that conducts or spon-
20 sors research, and any such agency that dis-
21 seminate information in developing research
22 and information product development agendas;

23 “(B) encouraging such agencies (as appro-
24 priate) to develop and implement dissemination
25 plans that specifically target State and local

1 governments and nongovernmental entities in-
2 volved in demand reduction; and

3 “(C) developing a single interagency clear-
4 inghouse for the dissemination of research and
5 information by such agencies to State and local
6 governments and nongovernmental agencies in-
7 volved in demand reduction.”.

8 (b) SURVEY OF DRUG USE.—(1) The University of
9 Michigan shall not be prohibited under any law from con-
10 ducting the survey of drug use among young people in the
11 United States known as the Monitoring the Future Sur-
12 vey.

13 (2) The National Parents’ Resource Institute for
14 Drug Education in Atlanta, Georgia, shall not be prohib-
15 ited under any law from conducting the survey of drug
16 use among young people in the United States known as
17 the National PRIDE Survey.

18 **SEC. 4. EXPANSION OF POWERS OF DIRECTOR.**

19 Section 1003(d) (21 U.S.C. 1502(d)) is amended—

20 (1) in paragraph (9), by striking the period and
21 inserting a semicolon; and

22 (2) by adding at the end the following new
23 paragraphs:

24 “(10) require the heads of National Drug Con-
25 trol Program agencies to provide the Director with

1 statistics, studies, reports, and any other informa-
2 tion regarding Federal control of drug abuse;

3 “(11) require the heads of National Drug Con-
4 trol Program agencies to provide the Director with
5 information regarding any position (before an indi-
6 vidual is nominated for such position) that—

7 “(A) relates to the National Drug Control
8 Program;

9 “(B) is at or above the level of Deputy As-
10 sistant Secretary; and

11 “(C) involves responsibility for Federal
12 counternarcotics or anti-drug programs; and

13 “(12) make recommendations to the National
14 Drug Intelligence Center on the specific projects
15 that the Director determines will enhance the effec-
16 tiveness of implementation of the National Drug
17 Control Strategy.”.

18 **SEC. 5. SUBMISSION OF NATIONAL DRUG CONTROL STRAT-**

19 **EGY.**

20 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 1005(a) is amended—

21 (1) by amending paragraph (2)(A) to read as
22 follows:

23 “(A) include comprehensive, research-based,
24 specific, long-range goals and performance measures
25 (including specific annual targets expressed in terms

1 of precise percentages) for reducing drug abuse and
2 the consequences of drug abuse in the United
3 States;”;

4 (2) by striking “and” at the end of paragraph
5 (2)(C);

6 (3) by striking paragraph (2)(D);

7 (4) by adding at the end of paragraph (2) the
8 following new paragraphs:

9 “(D) include 4-year projections for National
10 Drug Control Program priorities (including budget
11 priorities); and

12 “(E) review international, Federal, State, local,
13 and private sector drug control activities to ensure
14 that the United States pursues well-coordinated and
15 effective drug control at all levels of government.”;

16 (5) in paragraph (3)(A), by striking clauses (iv)
17 and (v) and inserting the following:

18 “(iv) private citizens and organizations with ex-
19 perience and expertise in demand reduction;

20 “(v) private citizens and organizations with ex-
21 perience and expertise in supply reduction; and

22 “(vi) appropriate representatives of foreign gov-
23 ernments.”;

24 (6) in paragraph (4)—

1 (A) in subparagraph (B), by amending
2 clauses (i) through (vi) to read as follows:

3 “(i) the quantities of cocaine, heroin, mari-
4 juana, methamphetamine, ecstasy, and rohypnol
5 available for consumption in the United States;

6 “(ii) the amount of cocaine, heroin, mari-
7 juana, ecstasy, rohypnol, methamphetamine,
8 and precursor chemicals entering the United
9 States;

10 “(iii) the number of hectares of marijuana,
11 poppy, and coca cultivated and destroyed do-
12 mestically and in other countries;

13 “(iv) the number of metric tons of mari-
14 juana, cocaine, heroin, and methamphetamine
15 seized;

16 “(v) the number of cocaine and meth-
17 amphetamine processing labs destroyed domes-
18 tically and in other countries;

19 “(vi) changes in the price and purity of
20 heroin and cocaine, changes in price of meth-
21 amphetamine, and changes in
22 tetrahydrocannabinol level of marijuana;”;

23 (B) by striking “and” at the end of sub-
24 paragraph (C);

1 (C) by striking the period at the end sub-
2 paragraph (D) and inserting “; and”; and

3 (D) by adding at the end the following new
4 subparagraph:

5 “(E) assessment of the cultivation of illegal
6 drugs in the United States.”; and

7 (7) in paragraph (5)—

8 (A) in the matter preceding subparagraph
9 (A), by striking “February 1, 1995” and insert-
10 ing “February 1, 1998”;

11 (B) in the matter preceding subparagraph
12 (A), by striking “second”;

13 (C) by striking “and” at the end of sub-
14 paragraph (C);

15 (D) by striking the period at the end of
16 subparagraph (D) and inserting “; and”; and

17 (E) by adding at the end the following new
18 subparagraph:

19 “(E) a description of the National Drug Con-
20 trol Program performance measures described in
21 subsection (a)(2)(A).”.

22 (b) GOALS AND PERFORMANCE MEASURES FOR NA-
23 TIONAL DRUG CONTROL STRATEGY.—Section 1005(b) is
24 amended—

1 (1) in the heading, by striking “, OBJECTIVES,
2 AND PRIORITIES” and inserting “AND PERFORM-
3 ANCE MEASURES”;

4 (2) in the matter after the heading, by inserting
5 “(1)” before “Each National Drug Control Strat-
6 egy”;

7 (3) by redesignating paragraphs (1) through
8 (6) as subparagraphs (A) through (F);

9 (4) in subparagraph (A) (as redesignated by
10 paragraph (3)), by striking “and priorities” and in-
11 serting “and performance measures”;

12 (5) in subparagraph (C) (as redesignated by
13 paragraph (3)), by striking “3-year projections” and
14 inserting “4-year projections”; and

15 (6) by adding at the end the following new
16 paragraph:

17 “(2) In establishing the performance measures re-
18 quired by this subsection, the Director shall—

19 “(A) establish performance measures and tar-
20 gets expressed in terms of precise percentages for
21 each National Drug Control Strategy goal and objec-
22 tive;

23 “(B) revise such performance measures and
24 targets as necessary, and reflect such performance

1 measures and targets in the National Drug Control
2 Program budget submitted to Congress;

3 “(C) consult with affected National Drug Con-
4 trol Program agencies;

5 “(D) identify programs and activities of Na-
6 tional Drug Control Program agencies that support
7 the goals of the National Drug Control Strategy;

8 “(E) evaluate in detail the implementation by
9 each National Drug Control Program agency of pro-
10 gram activities supporting the National Drug Con-
11 trol Strategy;

12 “(F) monitor consistency between the drug-re-
13 lated goals of the National Drug Control Program
14 agencies and ensure that drug control agency goals
15 and budgets fully support, and are fully consistent
16 with, the National Drug Control Strategy;

17 “(G) coordinate the development and implemen-
18 tation of national drug control data collection and
19 reporting systems to support Federal policy formula-
20 tion and performance measurement;

21 “(H) ensure that no Federal drug control funds
22 are expended for any study or contract relating to
23 the legalization (for a medical use or any other use)
24 of a substance listed in schedule I of section 202 of
25 the Controlled Substances Act (21 U.S.C. 812); and

1 “(I) ensure that no Federal funds appropriated
2 for the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Program
3 are expended for the expansion of drug treatment
4 programs.”.

5 **SEC. 6. REPORT ON DESIGNATION OF HIGH INTENSITY**
6 **DRUG TRAFFICKING AREAS.**

7 Section 1005(c)(3) is amended to read as follows:

8 “(3) Not later than March 1 of each year, the Direc-
9 tor shall submit to Congress a report—

10 “(A) on the effectiveness of, and need for, the
11 designation of areas under this subsection as high
12 intensity drug trafficking areas; and

13 “(B) that includes any recommendations of the
14 Director for legislative action with respect to such
15 designation.”.

16 **SEC. 7. REPROGRAMMING AND TRANSFER OF FUNDS.**

17 (a) **EXPANSION OF TRANSFER AUTHORITY.**—Section
18 1003(d)(8) (21 U.S.C. 1502(d)(8)) is amended to read as
19 follows:

20 “(8) except to the extent that the Director’s au-
21 thority under this paragraph is limited in an annual
22 appropriations Act, and with the concurrence of the
23 head of the affected agency and upon advance ap-
24 proval of the Committees on Appropriations and the
25 authorizing committees of the House of Representa-

1 tives and the Senate, transfer funds appropriated to
2 a National Drug Control Program agency program,
3 activity, or function designated by the Director pur-
4 suant to subsection (c) to a different National Drug
5 Control Program agency program, activity, or func-
6 tion designated by the Director pursuant to such
7 subsection in an amount that does not exceed 5 per-
8 cent of the amount appropriated to either program,
9 activity, or function;”.

10 (b) REPORT.—Section 1003(e)(7) (21 U.S.C.
11 1502(c)(7)) is amended to read as follows:

12 “(7)(A) The Director shall report to Congress on a
13 quarterly basis (beginning with the first quarter of 1998)
14 on—

15 “(i) the need for any reprogramming or trans-
16 fer of funds appropriated for National Drug Control
17 Program activities; and

18 “(ii) any funds appropriated for National Drug
19 Control Program activities that were reprogrammed
20 or transferred during the quarter covered by the re-
21 port.

22 “(B) The Director shall report to Congress as re-
23 quired by paragraph (A) not later than 30 days after the
24 last day of each applicable quarter.”.

1 **SEC. 8. LONG-TERM PLAN FOR REDUCTION OF DRUG USE.**

2 Section 1003 (21 U.S.C. 1502) is amended by adding
3 at the end the following new subsection:

4 “(g) LONG-TERM PLAN FOR REDUCTION OF DRUG
5 USE.—Not later than March 1, 1998, the Director shall
6 submit to Congress a long-term plan for reducing the pop-
7 ulation of illegal drug users in the United States by De-
8 cember 31, 2001, to 3 percent of the population of the
9 United States or less. Such plan shall include—

10 “(1) a request for funds and other resources
11 necessary to achieve such reduction within the guide-
12 lines of the balanced budget agreement of 1997; and

13 “(2) the justifications for each such request.”.

14 **SEC. 9. DRUG POLICY COUNCIL.**

15 The National Narcotics Leadership Act of 1988 (21
16 U.S.C. 1501 et seq.) is further amended by adding at the
17 end of chapter 1 the following new section:

18 **“SEC. 1013. DRUG POLICY COUNCIL.**

19 “(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established in the
20 Executive Office of the President a Drug Policy Council,
21 which shall be composed of the members of the President’s
22 cabinet, and the purpose of which shall be to make cabi-
23 net-level decisions regarding national drug policy.

24 “(b) CHAIRMAN.—The President shall be the Chair-
25 man of the Drug Policy Council established by subsection
26 (a).

1 “(c) EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR.—The Director of the
2 Office of National Drug Control Policy shall be the Execu-
3 tive Director of the Drug Policy Council established by
4 subsection (a).”.

5 **SEC. 10. DEFINITION OF NATIONAL DRUG CONTROL PRO-**
6 **GRAM AGENCY.**

7 Section 1010(6) (21 U.S.C. 1507(6)) is amended to
8 read as follows:

9 “(6) the term ‘National Drug Control Program
10 agency’ means any agency that is responsible for im-
11 plementing any aspect of the National Drug Control
12 Strategy, including any agency that receives Federal
13 funds to implement any aspect of the National Drug
14 Control Strategy;”.

15 **SEC. 11. EXTENSION OF DATE FOR TERMINATION OF OF-**
16 **FICE OF NATIONAL DRUG CONTROL POLICY.**

17 Section 1009 is amended by striking “September 30,
18 1997” and inserting “September 30, 1999”.

19 **SEC. 12. EXTENSION OF AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIA-**
20 **TIONS.**

21 Section 1011 is amended by striking “8 succeeding
22 fiscal years” and inserting “10 succeeding fiscal years”.

1 **SEC. 13. REPORT REQUIRED.**

2 Not later than November 1, 1997, the Director of the
3 Office of National Drug Control Policy shall submit to
4 Congress a report including—

5 (1) proposed goals, targets, performance meas-
6 ures (as described in section 1003(b)(1) of the Na-
7 tional Narcotics Leadership Act of 1998 (21 U.S.C.
8 1502(b)(1)), and specific initiatives with respect to
9 the National Drug Control Program, including the
10 High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area Program; and

11 (2) proposals to coordinate the efforts of all
12 National Drug Control Program agencies.

13 **SEC. 14. APPOINTMENT OF TEMPORARY ADMINISTRATOR**

15 **PROGRAM.**

16 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 1031(c) (21 U.S.C.
17 1531(c)) is amended—

18 (1) by inserting “(1)” after “(c) ADMINISTRA-
19 TION.—”; and

20 (2) by adding at the end the following new
21 paragraph:

22 “(2) The Director shall appoint an individual to act
23 as Administrator until such time as an individual is ap-
24 pointed to such position under paragraph (1).”.

25 (b) DEADLINE FOR APPOINTMENT.—The Director of
26 the Office of National Drug Control Policy shall appoint

1 an individual to act as Administrator of the Drug-Free
2 Communities Support Program under section 1031(c)(2)
3 of the National Narcotics Leadership Act of 1988 (as
4 added by subsection (a)) not later than 30 days after the
5 date of the enactment of this Act.

15 and

16 (D) by striking “subparagraph (A)” and
17 inserting “paragraph (1)”;

18 (2) by redesignating subsections (b) and (c) as
19 subsections (c) and (d) respectively.
