CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Expressing the sense of Congress concerning the human rights and humanitarian situation facing the women and girls of Afghanistan.

Whereas the legacy of the war in Afghanistan has had a devastating impact on the civilian population, and a particularly negative impact on the rights and security of women and girls;

Whereas the current environment is one in which the rights of women and girls are routinely violated, leading the Department of State in its 1997 Country Report on Human Rights, released January 30, 1998, to conclude that women are beaten for violating increasingly restrictive Taliban dress codes, which require women to be covered from head to toe, women are strictly prohibited from working outside the home, women and girls are denied the right to an education, women are forbidden from appearing outside the home unless accompanied by a male

family member, and beatings and death result from a failure to observe these restrictions;

Whereas the Secretary of State stated, in November 1997 at the Nasir Bagh Refugee Camp in Pakistan, that if a society is to move forward, women and girls must have access to schools and health care, be able to participate in the economy, and be protected from physical exploitation and abuse;

Whereas Afghanistan recognizes international human rights conventions such as the Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide, the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, the Covenant on the Rights of the Child, the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women, and the International Covenant on Economic, Social, and Cultural Rights, which espouses respect for basic human rights of all individuals without regard to race, religion, ethnicity, or gender;

Whereas the use of rape as an instrument of war is considered a grave breach of the Geneva Convention and a crime against humanity;

Whereas people who commit grave breaches of the Geneva Convention are to be apprehended and subject to trial;

Whereas there is significant credible evidence that warring parties, factions, and powers in Afghanistan are responsible for numerous human rights violations, including the systematic rape of women and girls;

Whereas in recent years Afghan maternal mortality rates have increased dramatically, and the level of women's health care has declined significantly;

Whereas there has been a marked upswing in human rights violations against women and girls since the Taliban coalition seized Kabul in 1996, including Taliban edicts denying women and girls the right to an education, employment, access to adequate health care, and direct access to humanitarian aid; and

Whereas peace and security in Afghanistan are conducive to the full restoration of all human rights and fundamental freedom, the voluntary repatriation of refugees to their homeland in safety and dignity, the clearance of mine fields, and the reconstruction and rehabilitation of Afghanistan: Now, therefore, be it

2 *concurring), That Congress—*

3 (1) deplors the continued human rights viola-
4 tions by all parties, factions, and powers in Afghani-
5 stan;

6 (2) condemns targeted discrimination against
7 women and girls and expresses deep concern regard-
8 ing the prohibitions on employment and education;

9 (3) strongly condemns the use of rape or other
10 forms of systematic gender discrimination by any
11 party, faction, or power in Afghanistan as an instru-
12 ment of war;

13 (4) calls on all parties, factions, and powers in
14 Afghanistan to respect international norms and
15 standards of human rights;

1 (5) calls on all Afghan parties to bring an end
2 without delay to—

3 (A) discrimination on the basis of gender;

4 and

5 (B) deprivation of human rights of women;

6 (6) calls on all Afghan parties in particular to
7 take measures to ensure—

8 (A) the effective participation of women in
9 civil, economic, political, and social life through-
10 out the country;

11 (B) respect for the right of women to
12 work;

13 (C) the right of women and girls to an
14 education without discrimination, reopening
15 schools to women and girls at all levels of edu-
16 cation;

17 (D) respect for the right of women to
18 physical security;

19 (E) those responsible for physical attacks
20 on women are brought to justice;

21 (F) respect for freedom of movement of
22 women and their effective access to health care;

23 and

24 (G) equal access of women to health facili-
25 ties;

1 (7) supports the work of nongovernmental orga-
2 nizations advocating respect for human rights in Af-
3 ghanistan and an improvement in the status of
4 women and their access to humanitarian and devel-
5 opment assistance and programs;

6 (8) calls on the international community to pro-
7 vide, on a nondiscriminatory basis, adequate human-
8 itarian assistance to the people of Afghanistan and
9 Afghan refugees in neighboring countries pending
10 their voluntary repatriation, and requests all parties
11 in Afghanistan to lift the restrictions imposed on
12 international aid and to cease any action which may
13 prevent or impede the delivery of humanitarian as-
14 sistance;

15 (9) welcomes the appointment of Ambassador
16 Lakhdar Brahimi as special envoy of the United Na-
17 tions Secretary General for Afghanistan, and en-
18 courages United Nations efforts to produce a dura-
19 ble peace in Afghanistan consistent with the goal of
20 a broad-based national government respectful of
21 human rights; and

22 (10) calls on all warring parties, factions, and
23 powers to participate with Ambassador Brahimi in
24 an intra-Afghan dialogue regarding the peace proc-
25 ess.

1 **SEC. 2. ADDITIONAL ACTION BY PRESIDENT.**

2 It is the sense of Congress that the President and
3 Secretary of State should—

4 (1) work with the United Nations High Com-
5 missioner for Refugees and the international com-
6 munity to—

7 (A) guarantee the safety of, and provide
8 international development assistance for, Af-
9 ghan women’s groups in Pakistan and Afghani-
10 stan;

11 (B) increase support for refugee programs
12 in Pakistan providing assistance to Afghan
13 women and children with an emphasis on
14 health, education, and income-generating pro-
15 grams; and

16 (C) explore options for the resettlement of
17 those Afghan women, particularly war widows
18 and their families, who are under threat or who
19 fear for their safety or the safety of their fami-
20 lies;

21 (2) establish an Afghanistan Women’s Initia-
22 tive, based on the successful model of the Bosnian
23 Women’s Initiative and the Rwandan Women’s Ini-
24 tiative, that is targeted at Afghan women’s groups,
25 in order to—

1 (A) facilitate organization among Afghan
2 women's groups in Pakistan and Afghanistan;

3 (B) provide humanitarian and development
4 services to the women and the families most in
5 need; and

6 (C) promote women's economic security;

7 (3) make a policy determination that—

8 (A) recognition of any government in Af-
9 ghanistan by the United States should depend,
10 among other things, on the human rights poli-
11 cies towards women adopted by that govern-
12 ment;

13 (B) the United States should not recognize
14 any government which systematically maltreats
15 women; and

16 (C) any nonemergency economic or devel-
17 opment assistance will be based on respect for
18 human rights; and

19 (4) call for the creation of—

20 (A) an international commission to estab-
21 lish a record of the criminal culpability of any
22 individual or party in Afghanistan employing
23 rape or other crimes against humanity consid-
24 ered a grave breach of the Geneva Convention
25 as an instrument of war; and

1 (B) an ad hoc international criminal tribu-
2 nal by the United Nations for the purposes of
3 indicting, prosecuting, and imprisoning any in-
4 dividual responsible for crimes against human-
5 ity in Afghanistan.

6 **SEC. 3. REPORT.**

7 It is the sense of Congress that the Secretary of State
8 should submit a report to Congress not later than 6
9 months after the date of the adoption of this resolution
10 regarding actions that have been taken to implement this
11 resolution.
