Mr. FRANKS of New Jersey submitted the following concurrent resolution;
which was referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Authorizing the Law Enforcement Torch Run for the 1999
Special Olympics World Games to be run through the
Capitol Grounds.

1 *Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate*
2 *concurring),*

3 **SECTION 1. AUTHORIZATION OF TORCH RUN THROUGH**
4 **CAPITOL GROUNDS.**

5 Special Olympics (in this resolution referred to as the
6 “sponsor”) shall be permitted to sponsor a public event,
7 the Law Enforcement Torch Run for the 1999 Special
8 Olympics World Games (in this resolution referred to as
9 the “event”), on the Capitol Grounds on June 18, 1999,
10 or on such other date as the Speaker of the House of Rep-

1 representatives and the Committee on Rules and Administra-
2 tion of the Senate may jointly designate.

3 **SEC. 2. TERMS AND CONDITIONS.**

4 (a) **IN GENERAL.**—The event shall be free of admis-
5 sion charge to the public and arranged not to interfere
6 with the needs of Congress, under conditions to be pre-
7 scribed by the Architect of the Capitol and the Capitol
8 Police Board.

9 (b) **EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES.**—The sponsor shall
10 assume full responsibility for all expenses and liabilities
11 incident to all activities associated with the event.

12 **SEC. 3. STRUCTURES AND EQUIPMENT.**

13 (a) **STRUCTURES AND EQUIPMENT.**—Subject to the
14 approval of the Architect of the Capitol, the sponsor may
15 erect upon the Capitol Grounds such stage, sound amplifi-
16 cation devices, and other related structures and equipment
17 as may be required for the event.

18 (b) **ADDITIONAL ARRANGEMENTS.**—The Architect of
19 the Capitol and the Capitol Police Board are authorized
20 to make any such additional arrangements as may be re-
21 quired to carry out the event.

22 **SEC. 4. ENFORCEMENT OF RESTRICTIONS.**

23 The Capitol Police Board shall provide for enforce-
24 ment of the restrictions contained in section 4 of the Act
25 of July 31, 1946 (40 U.S.C. 193d; 60 Stat. 718), con-

1 cerning sales, advertisements, and solicitations on the
2 Capitol Grounds, as well as other restrictions applicable
3 to the Capitol Grounds, with respect to the event.

4 **SEC. 5. LIMITATIONS ON REPRESENTATIONS.**

5 (a) IN GENERAL.—No person may represent, either
6 directly or indirectly, that this resolution or any activity
7 carried out under this resolution in any way constitutes
8 approval or endorsement by the Federal Government of
9 any person or any product or service.

10 (b) ENFORCEMENT.—The Architect of the Capitol
11 and the Capitol Police Board shall enter into an agree-
12 ment with the sponsor, and such other persons partici-
13 pating in the event authorized by section 1 as the Archi-
14 tect of the Capitol and the Capitol Police Board consider
15 appropriate, under which such persons shall agree to com-
16 ply with the requirements of subsection (a). The agree-
17 ment shall specifically prohibit the use of any photograph
18 taken at the event for a commercial purpose and shall pro-
19 vide for the imposition of financial penalties if any viola-
20 tions of the agreement occur.

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
