CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Authorizing the 1999 District of Columbia Special Olympics
Law Enforcement Torch Run to be run through the
Capitol Grounds.

1 *Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate*
2 *concurring),*

1 **SECTION 1. AUTHORIZATION OF RUNNING OF D.C. SPECIAL**
2 **OLYMPICS LAW ENFORCEMENT TORCH RUN**
3 **THROUGH CAPITOL GROUNDS.**

4 On June 11, 1999, or on such other date as the
5 Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Com-
6 mittee on Rules and Administration of the Senate may
7 jointly designate, the 1999 District of Columbia Special
8 Olympics Law Enforcement Torch Run (in this resolution
9 referred to as the “event”) may be run through the Cap-
10 itol Grounds as part of the journey of the Special Olympics
11 torch to the District of Columbia Special Olympics sum-
12 mer games at Gallaudet University in the District of Co-
13 lumbia.

14 **SEC. 2. RESPONSIBILITY OF CAPITOL POLICE BOARD.**

15 The Capitol Police Board shall take such actions as
16 may be necessary to carry out the event.

17 **SEC. 3. CONDITIONS RELATING TO PHYSICAL PREPARA-**
18 **TIONS.**

19 The Architect of the Capitol may prescribe conditions
20 for physical preparations for the event.

21 **SEC. 4. ENFORCEMENT OF RESTRICTIONS.**

22 The Capitol Police Board shall provide for enforce-
23 ment of the restrictions contained in section 4 of the Act
24 of July 31, 1946 (40 U.S.C. 193d; 60 Stat. 718), con-
25 cerning sales, displays, and solicitations on the Capitol

- 1 Grounds, as well as other restrictions applicable to the
- 2 Capitol Grounds, with respect to the event.
