# H. R. 2097

To require the Secretary of the Treasury to mint coins in commemoration of the U.S.S. New Jersey, and for other purposes.

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## IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Mr. FRELINGHUYSEN (for himself, Mr. FRANKS of New Jersey, Mr. MENENDEZ, Mr. PASCARELL, Mrs. ROUKEMA, Mr. HOLT, Mr. PAYNE, Mr. ROTHMAN, and Mr. SMITH of New Jersey) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Banking and Financial Services

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## A BILL

To require the Secretary of the Treasury to mint coins in commemoration of the U.S.S. New Jersey, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “U.S.S. New Jersey  
5       Commemorative Coin Act”.

6       **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7       Congress finds the following:

8               (1) The U.S.S. New Jersey was launched De-  
9       cember 7, 1942, the start of nearly 50 years of dedi-

1 cated service to our Nation prior to final decommissioning in 1991.

3 (2) After commissioning, the U.S.S. New Jersey was sent to the Pacific, and played a key role in operations in the Marshalls, Marianas, Carolines, Philippines, Iwo Jima, and Okinawa, with a particular highlight being the U.S.S. New Jersey's service as the flagship for Commander 3d Fleet, Admiral William "Bull" Halsey, during the Battle of Leyte Gulf in October 1944.

11 (3) After the Allied victory in World War II, the U.S.S. New Jersey was deactivated in 1948 until being called to service for the second time, in November 1950.

15 (4) The U.S.S. New Jersey served two tours in the Western Pacific during the Korean War, serving as flagship for Commander 7th Fleet.

18 (5) After her valiant service during the Korean War, the U.S.S. New Jersey was again mothballed in 1957, only to be re-activated again in 1968 to serve as the only active-duty Navy battleship.

22 (6) The U.S.S. New Jersey served a successful tour during the Vietnam conflict, providing critical major-caliber fire support for friendly troops, before again being decommissioned in December 1969.

1           (7) The U.S.S. New Jersey's service to our  
2 country did not end with the Vietnam conflict, as  
3 she was again called to active duty status in Decem-  
4 ber 1982 and provided a show of strength off the  
5 coast of Nicaragua, in Central America in 1983.

6           (8) The Navy again called upon the U.S.S. New  
7 Jersey to provide critical support by sending her to  
8 the Mediterranean in 1983 to provide critical fire  
9 support to Marines in embattled Beirut, Lebanon.

10          (9) The U.S.S. New Jersey continued to serve  
11 the Navy in a variety of roles, including regular de-  
12 ployments in the Western Pacific.

13          (10) The U.S.S. New Jersey was decommis-  
14 sioned for the fourth and final time in February  
15 1991.

16          (11) In 1998 Congress passed legislation to de-  
17 commission the U.S.S. New Jersey and permanently  
18 berth her in the State of New Jersey.

19          (12) The State has strongly endorsed bringing  
20 the U.S.S. New Jersey home, and has issued com-  
21 memorative license plates and taken other steps to  
22 raise funds for the costs of relocating the U.S.S.  
23 New Jersey.

1           (13) The New Jersey congressional delegation  
2           is united in its support for bringing the U.S.S. New  
3           Jersey home to New Jersey.

4 **SEC. 3. COIN SPECIFICATIONS.**

5           (a) DENOMINATION.—In commemoration of the  
6 U.S.S. New Jersey, the Secretary of the Treasury (here-  
7 after in this Act referred to as the “Secretary”) shall mint  
8 and issue not more than 500,000 \$1 coins, each of which  
9 shall—

10           (1) weigh 26.73 grams;

11           (2) have a diameter of 1.500 inches; and

12           (3) contain 90 percent silver and 10 percent  
13 copper.

14           (b) LEGAL TENDER.—The coins minted under this  
15 Act shall be legal tender, as provided in section 5103 of  
16 title 31, United States Code.

17           (c) NUMISMATIC ITEMS.—For purposes of section  
18 5136 of title 31, United States Code, all coins minted  
19 under this Act shall be considered to be numismatic items.

20 **SEC. 4. SOURCES OF BULLION.**

21           The Secretary may obtain silver for minting coins  
22 under this Act from any available source, including stock-  
23 piles established under the Strategic and Critical Mate-  
24 rials Stock Piling Act.

1 **SEC. 5. DESIGN OF COINS.**

2 (a) DESIGN REQUIREMENTS.—

3 (1) IN GENERAL.—The design of the coins  
4 minted under this Act shall be emblematic of service  
5 of the U.S.S. New Jersey.

6 (2) DESIGNATION AND INSCRIPTIONS.—On  
7 each coin minted under this Act there shall be—

8 (A) a designation of the value of the coin;

9 (B) an inscription of the year “2002”; and

10 (C) inscriptions of the words “Liberty”,  
11 “In God We Trust”, “United States of Amer-  
12 ica”, and “E Pluribus Unum”.

13 (3) OBVERSE OF COIN.—The obverse of each  
14 coin minted under this Act shall bear the likeness of  
15 the U.S.S. New Jersey.

16 (4) GENERAL DESIGN.—In designing this coin,  
17 the Secretary shall also consider incorporating ap-  
18 propriate elements from the tenure of service of the  
19 U.S.S. New Jersey in the Navy.

20 (b) SELECTION.—The design for the coins minted  
21 under this Act shall be selected by the Secretary after con-  
22 sultation with the Commission of Fine Arts and shall be  
23 reviewed by the Citizens Commemorative Coin Advisory  
24 Committee.

1 **SEC. 6. ISSUANCE OF COINS.**

2 (a) QUALITY OF COINS.—Coins minted under this  
3 Act shall be issued in uncirculated and proof qualities.

4 (b) MINT FACILITY.—Only one facility of the United  
5 States Mint may be used to strike any particular quality  
6 of the coins minted under this Act.

7 (c) PERIOD FOR ISSUANCE.—The Secretary may  
8 issue coins minted under this Act only during the period  
9 beginning on January 1, 2002, and ending on December  
10 31, 2002.

11 **SEC. 7. SALE OF COINS.**

12 (a) SALE PRICE.—The coins issued under this Act  
13 shall be sold by the Secretary at a price equal to the sum  
14 of—

15 (1) the face value of the coins;

16 (2) the surcharge provided in subsection (d)  
17 with respect to such coins; and

18 (3) the cost of designing and issuing the coins  
19 (including labor, materials, dies, use of machinery,  
20 overhead expenses, marketing, and shipping).

21 (b) BULK SALES.—The Secretary shall make bulk  
22 sales of the coins issued under this Act at a reasonable  
23 discount.

24 (c) PREPAID ORDERS.—

1           (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall accept  
2           prepaid orders for the coins minted under this Act  
3           before the issuance of such coins.

4           (2) DISCOUNT.—Sale prices with respect to pre-  
5           paid orders under paragraph (1) shall be at a rea-  
6           sonable discount.

7           (d) SURCHARGES.—All sales of coins minted under  
8           this Act shall include a surcharge of \$10 per coin.

9   **SEC. 8. DISTRIBUTION OF SURCHARGES.**

10          (a) IN GENERAL.—Subject to section 5134(f) of title  
11          31, United States Code, 10 percent of the proceeds from  
12          the surcharges received by the Secretary from the sale of  
13          coins issued under this Act shall be promptly paid by the  
14          Secretary to the U.S.S. New Jersey Battleship Founda-  
15          tion in Middletown, New Jersey, for activities associated  
16          with the costs of moving the U.S.S. New Jersey and per-  
17          manently berthing her in her new location.

18          (b) AUDITS.—The U.S.S. New Jersey Battleship  
19          Foundation shall be subject to the audit requirements of  
20          section 5134(f)(2) of title 31, United States Code.

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
