Mr. LOTT (for himself, Mr. COCHRAN, Mr. ROBB, and Mr. JEFFORDS) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources

A BILL

To establish the Corinth Unit of Shiloh National Military Park, in the vicinity of the city of Corinth, Mississippi, and in the State of Tennessee, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Corinth Battlefield
5 Preservation Act of 1999”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.**

7 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—

8 (1) in 1996, Congress authorized the establish-
9 ment and construction of a center—

1 (A) to facilitate the interpretation of the
2 Siege and Battle of Corinth and other Civil
3 War actions in the area in and around the city
4 of Corinth, Mississippi; and

5 (B) to enhance public understanding of the
6 significance of the Corinth campaign and the
7 Civil War relative to the western theater of op-
8 erations, in cooperation with—

9 (i) State or local governmental enti-
10 ties;

11 (ii) private organizations; and

12 (iii) individuals;

13 (2) the Corinth Battlefield was ranked as a pri-
14 ority 1 battlefield having critical need for coordi-
15 nated nationwide action by the year 2000 by the
16 Civil War Sites Advisory Commission in its report
17 on Civil War Battlefields of the United States;

18 (3) there is a national interest in protecting and
19 preserving sites of historic significance associated
20 with the Civil War; and

21 (4) the States of Mississippi and Tennessee and
22 their respective local units of government—

23 (A) have the authority to prevent or mini-
24 mize adverse uses of these historic resources;
25 and

1 (B) can play a significant role in the pro-
2 tection of the historic resources related to the
3 Civil War battles fought in the area in and
4 around the city of Corinth.

5 (b) PURPOSES.—The purposes of this Act are—

6 (1) to establish the Corinth Unit of the Shiloh
7 National Military Park—

8 (A) in the city of Corinth, Mississippi; and

9 (B) in the State of Tennessee;

10 (2) to direct the Secretary of the Interior to
11 manage, protect, and interpret the resources associ-
12 ated with the Civil War Siege and the Battle of Cor-
13 inth that occurred in and around the city of Corinth,
14 in cooperation with—

15 (A) the State of Mississippi;

16 (B) the State of Tennessee;

17 (C) the city of Corinth, Mississippi;

18 (D) other public entities; and

19 (E) the private sector; and

20 (3) to authorize a special resource study to
21 identify other Civil War sites area in and around the
22 city of Corinth that—

23 (A) are consistent with the themes of the
24 Siege and Battle of Corinth;

1 (B) meet the criteria for designation as a
2 unit of the National Park System; and

3 (C) are considered appropriate for inclu-
4 sion in the Unit.

5 **SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.**

6 In this Act:

7 (1) MAP.—The term “Map” means the map en-
8 titled “Corinth Unit”, numbered 304/80,007, and
9 dated October 1998.

10 (2) PARK.—The term “Park” means the Shiloh
11 National Military Park.

12 (3) SECRETARY.—The term “Secretary” means
13 the Secretary of the Interior.

14 (4) UNIT.—The term “Unit” means the Cor-
15 inth Unit of Shiloh National Military Park estab-
16 lished under section 4.

17 **SEC. 4. ESTABLISHMENT OF UNIT.**

18 (a) IN GENERAL.—There is established in the States
19 of Mississippi and Tennessee the Corinth Unit of the Shi-
20 loh National Military Park.

21 (b) COMPOSITION OF UNIT.—The Unit shall be com-
22 prised of—

23 (1) the tract consisting of approximately 20
24 acres generally depicted as “Park Boundary” on the
25 Map, and containing—

1 (A) the Battery Robinett; and

2 (B) the site of the interpretive center au-
3 thorized under section 602 of the Omnibus
4 Parks and Public Lands Management Act of
5 1996 (16 U.S.C. 430f-5); and

6 (2) any additional land that the Secretary de-
7 termines to be suitable for inclusion in the Unit
8 that—

9 (A) is under the ownership of a public en-
10 tity or nonprofit organization; and

11 (B) has been identified by the Siege and
12 Battle of Corinth National Historic Landmark
13 Study, dated January 8, 1991.

14 (c) AVAILABILITY OF MAP.—The Map shall be on file
15 and available for public inspection in the office of the Di-
16 rector of the National Park Service.

17 **SEC. 5. LAND ACQUISITION.**

18 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary may acquire land
19 and interests in land within the boundary of the Park as
20 depicted on the Map, by—

21 (1) donation;

22 (2) purchase with donated or appropriated
23 funds; or

24 (3) exchange.

1 (b) EXCEPTION.—Land may be acquired only by do-
2 nation from—

3 (1) the State of Mississippi (including a polit-
4 ical subdivision of the State);

5 (2) the State of Tennessee (including a political
6 subdivision of the State); or

7 (3) the organization known as “Friends of the
8 Siege and Battle of Corinth”.

9 **SEC. 6. PARK MANAGEMENT AND ADMINISTRATION.**

10 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall administer
11 the Unit in accordance with this Act and the laws gen-
12 erally applicable to units of the National Park System,
13 including—

14 (1) the Act entitled “An Act to establish a Na-
15 tional Park Service, and for other purposes”, ap-
16 proved August 25, 1916 (16 U.S.C. 1 et seq.); and

17 (2) the Act entitled “An Act to provide for the
18 preservation of historic American sites, buildings,
19 objects, and antiquities of national significance, and
20 for other purposes”, approved August 21, 1935 (16
21 U.S.C. 461 et seq.).

22 (b) DUTIES.—In accordance with section 602 of the
23 Omnibus Parks and Public Lands Management Act of
24 1996 (16 U.S.C. 430f–5), the Secretary shall—

1 (1) commemorate and interpret, for the benefit
2 of visitors and the general public, the Siege and Bat-
3 tle of Corinth and other Civil War actions in the
4 area in and around the city of Corinth within the
5 larger context of the Civil War and American his-
6 tory, including the significance of the Civil War
7 Siege and Battle of Corinth in 1862 in relation to
8 other operations in the western theater of the Civil
9 War; and

10 (2) identify and preserve surviving features
11 from the Civil War era in the area in and around
12 the city of Corinth, including both military and civil-
13 ian themes that include—

14 (A) the role of railroads in the Civil War;

15 (B) the story of the Corinth contraband
16 camp; and

17 (C) the development of field fortifications
18 as a tactic of war.

19 (c) COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS.—

20 (1) IN GENERAL.—To carry this Act, the Sec-
21 retary may enter into cooperative agreements with
22 entities in the public and private sectors, including—

23 (A) colleges and universities;

24 (B) historical societies;

25 (C) State and local agencies; and

1 (D) nonprofit organizations.

2 (2) TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE.—To develop coop-
 3 erative land use strategies and conduct activities
 4 that facilitate the conservation of the historic, cul-
 5 tural, natural, and scenic resources of the Unit, the
 6 Secretary may provide technical assistance, to the
 7 extent that a recipient of technical assistance is en-
 8 gaged in the protection, interpretation, or commemo-
 9 ration of historically significant Civil War resources
 10 in the area in and around the city of Corinth, to—

11 (A) the State of Mississippi (including a
 12 political subdivision of the State);

13 (B) the State of Tennessee (including a
 14 political subdivision of the State);

15 (C) a governmental entity;

16 (D) a nonprofit organization; and

17 (E) a private property owner.

18 (d) RESOURCES OUTSIDE THE UNIT.—Nothing in
 19 subsection (c)(2) authorizes the Secretary to own or man-
 20 age any resource outside the Unit.

21 **SEC. 7. AUTHORIZATION OF SPECIAL RESOURCE STUDY.**

22 (a) IN GENERAL.—To determine whether certain ad-
 23 ditional properties are appropriate for inclusion in the
 24 Unit, the Secretary shall conduct a special resource study

1 of land in and around the city of Corinth, Mississippi, and
2 nearby areas in the State of Tennessee that—

3 (1) have a relationship to the Civil War Siege
4 and Battle of Corinth in 1862; and

5 (2) are under the ownership of—

6 (A) the State of Mississippi (including a
7 political subdivision of the State);

8 (B) the State of Tennessee (including a
9 political subdivision of the State);

10 (C) a nonprofit organization; or

11 (D) a private person.

12 (b) CONTENTS OF STUDY.—The study shall—

13 (1) identify the full range of resources and his-
14 toric themes associated with the Civil War Siege and
15 Battle of Corinth in 1862, including the relationship
16 of the campaign to other operations in the western
17 theater of the Civil War that occurred in—

18 (A) the area in and around the city of Cor-
19 inth; and

20 (B) the State of Tennessee;

21 (2) identify alternatives for preserving features
22 from the Civil War era in the area in and around
23 the city of Corinth, including both military and civil-
24 ian themes involving—

1 (A) the role of the railroad in the Civil
2 War;

3 (B) the story of the Corinth contraband
4 camp; and

5 (C) the development of field fortifications
6 as a tactic of war;

7 (3) identify potential partners that might sup-
8 port efforts by the Secretary to carry out this Act,
9 including—

10 (A) State entities and their political sub-
11 divisions;

12 (B) historical societies and commissions;

13 (C) civic groups; and

14 (D) nonprofit organizations;

15 (4) identify alternatives to avoid land use con-
16 flicts; and

17 (5) include cost estimates for any necessary ac-
18 tivity associated with the alternatives identified
19 under this subsection, including—

20 (A) acquisition;

21 (B) development;

22 (C) interpretation;

23 (D) operation; and

24 (E) maintenance.

1 (c) REPORT.—Not later than 1 year and 180 days
2 after the date on which funds are made available to carry
3 out this section, the Secretary shall submit a report de-
4 scribing the findings of the study under subsection (a)
5 to—

6 (1) the Committee on Energy and Natural Re-
7 sources of the Senate; and

8 (2) the Committee on Resources of the House
9 of Representatives.

10 **SEC. 8. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

11 There are authorized to be appropriated such sums
12 as are necessary to carry out this Act, including
13 \$3,000,000 for the construction of an interpretive center
14 under section 602(d) of title VI of the Omnibus Parks and
15 Public Lands Management Act of 1996 (16 U.S.C. 430f-
16 5(d)).

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
