To amend the Act entitled “An Act to provide for the establishment of Fort Clatsop National Memorial in the State of Oregon, and for other purposes.”.

Mr. WYDEN (for himself and Mr. SMITH of Oregon) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources

A BILL

To amend the Act entitled “An Act to provide for the establishment of Fort Clatsop National Memorial in the State of Oregon, and for other purposes.”.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Fort Clatsop National
5 Memorial Expansion Act of 2000”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS**

7 The Congress finds the following:

8 (1) In 1805, the members of the Lewis and
9 Clark Expedition built Fort Clatsop at the mouth of

1 the Columbia River near Astoria, Oregon, where
2 they spent 106 days waiting for the end of winter
3 and preparing for their journey home. The Fort
4 Clatsop National Memorial was created by Congress
5 in 1958 for the purpose of commemorating the cul-
6 mination, and the winter encampment, of the Lewis
7 and Clark Expedition following its successful cross-
8 ing of the North American continent, and is the only
9 National Park Service site solely dedicated to the
10 Lewis and Clark Expedition.

11 (2) The 1995 General Management Plan for
12 the Fort Clatsop National Memorial, prepared with
13 input from the local community, calls for the addi-
14 tion of lands to the memorial to include the trail
15 used by expedition members to travel from the fort
16 to the Pacific Ocean and to include the shore and
17 forest lands surrounding the fort and trail to protect
18 their natural settings.

19 (3) The area near present day McGowan,
20 Washington where Lewis and Clark and the Corps
21 of Discovery camped after reaching the Pacific
22 Ocean, performed detailed surveying, and conducted
23 the historic “vote” to determine where to spend the
24 winter, is of undisputed national significance.

1 (4) The National Park Service and State of
2 Washington should identify the best alternative for
3 adequately and cost effectively protecting and inter-
4 preting the “Station Camp” site.

5 (5) Expansion of the Fort Clatsop National Me-
6 morial would require Federal legislation because the
7 size of the memorial is currently limited by statute
8 to 130 acres.

9 (6) Congressional action to allow for the expan-
10 sion of Fort Clatsop for both the trail to the Pacific
11 and, possibly, the Station Camp site would be both
12 timely and appropriate before the start of the na-
13 tional bicentennial celebration of the Lewis and
14 Clark Expedition planned to take place during the
15 years 2004 through 2006.

16 **SEC. 3. ACQUISITION OF LANDS FOR FORT CLATSOP NA-**
17 **TIONAL MEMORIAL.**

18 The Act entitled “An Act to provide for the establish-
19 ment of Fort Clatsop National Memorial in the State of
20 Oregon, and for other purposes.”, approved May 29, 1958
21 (Chapter 158; 72 Stat. 153), is amended—

22 (1) by inserting in section 2 “(a)” before “The
23 Secretary”;

1 (2) by inserting in section 2 a period, “.”, fol-
2 lowing “coast” and by striking the remainder of the
3 section;

4 (3) by inserting in section 2 the following new
5 subsections:

6 “(b) The Memorial shall also include the lands de-
7 picted on the map entitled ‘Fort Clatsop Boundary Map’,
8 numbered and dated ‘405–80016–CCO–June–1996’. The
9 area designated in the map as a ‘buffer zone’ shall not
10 be developed but shall be managed as a visual buffer be-
11 tween a commemorative trail that will run through the
12 property, and contiguous private land holdings.

13 “(c) The total area designated as the Memorial shall
14 contain no more than 1,500 acres.”; and

15 (4) by inserting at the end of section 3 the fol-
16 lowing:

17 “(b) Such lands included within the newly expanded
18 boundary may be acquired from willing sellers only, with
19 the exception of corporately owned timberlands.”.

20 **SEC. 4. AUTHORIZATION OF STUDY OF STATION CAMP.**

21 The Secretary of the Interior shall conduct a study
22 of the area known as “Station Camp” near McGowan,
23 Washington, to determine its suitability, feasibility, and
24 national significance, for inclusion into the National Park

1 System. The study shall be conducted in accordance with
2 section 8 of Public Law 91-383 (16 U.S.C. 1a-5).

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
