Mr. REYNOLDS (for himself and Mr. CANTOR) introduced the following bill;
which was referred to the Committee on International Relations

A BILL

To take certain steps toward recognition by the United
States of Jerusalem as the capital of Israel.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. UNITED STATES POLICY REGARDING JERU-**
4 **SALEM AS THE CAPITAL OF ISRAEL.**

5 (a) LIMITATION ON OPERATION OF CONSULATE IN
6 JERUSALEM.—Notwithstanding any other provision of
7 law, the United States shall not operate a United States
8 consulate or diplomatic facility in Jerusalem unless such
9 consulate or diplomatic facility is under the supervision
10 of the United States Ambassador to Israel.

1 (b) IDENTIFICATION OF JERUSALEM AS THE CAP-
2 ITAL OF ISRAEL IN OFFICIAL GOVERNMENT DOCU-
3 MENTS.—Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any
4 official document of the United States Government which
5 lists countries and their capital cities shall identify Jeru-
6 salem as the capital of Israel.

7 (c) RECORD OF PLACE OF BIRTH AS ISRAEL FOR
8 PASSPORT PURPOSES.—For purposes of the registration
9 of birth, certification of nationality, or issuance of a pass-
10 port of a United States citizen born in the city of Jeru-
11 salem, the Secretary of State shall, upon the request of
12 the citizen or the citizen's legal guardian, record the place
13 of birth as Israel.
