Mr. McCONNELL submitted the following resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Rules and Administration

RESOLUTION

Authorizing expenditures by committees of the Senate for the periods March 1, 2001, through September 30, 2001, October 1, 2001, through September 30, 2002, and October 1, 2002, through February 28, 2003.

1 *Resolved,*

2 **SECTION 1. AGGREGATE AUTHORIZATION.**

3 (a) IN GENERAL.—For purposes of carrying out the
4 powers, duties, and functions under the Standing Rules
5 of the Senate, and under the appropriate authorizing reso-
6 lutions of the Senate there is authorized for the period
7 March 1, 2001, through September 30, 2001, in the ag-
8 gregate of \$39,909,797, for the period October 1, 2001,

1 through September 30, 2002, in the aggregate of
2 \$70,788,088, and for the period October 1, 2002, through
3 February 28, 2003, in the aggregate of \$30,273,086, in
4 accordance with the provisions of this resolution, for
5 standing committees of the Senate (except the Committee
6 on the Judiciary), the Special Committee on Aging, the
7 Select Committee on Intelligence, and the Committee on
8 Indian Affairs.

9 (b) AGENCY CONTRIBUTIONS.—There are authorized
10 such sums as may be necessary for agency contributions
11 related to the compensation of employees of the commit-
12 tees for the period March 1, 2001, through September 30,
13 2001, for the period October 1, 2001, through September
14 30, 2002, and for the period October 1, 2002, through
15 February 28, 2003, to be paid from the appropriations
16 account for “Expenses of Inquiries and Investigations” of
17 the Senate.

18 **SEC. 2. COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE, NUTRITION, AND**
19 **FORESTRY.**

20 (a) GENERAL AUTHORITY.—In carrying out its pow-
21 ers, duties, and functions under the Standing Rules of the
22 Senate, in accordance with its jurisdiction under rule XXV
23 of such rules, including holding hearings, reporting such
24 hearings, and making investigations as authorized by
25 paragraphs 1 and 8 of rule XXVI of the Standing Rules

1 of the Senate, the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition,
2 and Forestry is authorized from March 1, 2001, through
3 February 28, 2003, in its discretion—

4 (1) to make expenditures from the contingent
5 fund of the Senate;

6 (2) to employ personnel; and

7 (3) with the prior consent of the Government
8 department or agency concerned and the Committee
9 on Rules and Administration, to use on a reimburs-
10 able, or nonreimbursable, basis the services of per-
11 sonnel of any such department or agency.

12 (b) EXPENSES FOR PERIOD ENDING SEPTEMBER 30,
13 2001.—The expenses of the committee for the period
14 March 1, 2001, through September 30, 2001, under this
15 section shall not exceed \$1,794,378, of which amount—

16 (1) not to exceed \$20,000, may be expended for
17 the procurement of the services of individual consult-
18 ants, or organizations thereof (as authorized by sec-
19 tion 202(i) of the Legislative Reorganization Act of
20 1946 (2 U.S.C. 72a(i))); and

21 (2) not to exceed \$4,000, may be expended for
22 the training of the professional staff of such com-
23 mittee (under procedures specified by section 202(j)
24 of that Act).

1 (c) EXPENSES FOR FISCAL YEAR 2002 PERIOD.—

2 The expenses of the committee for the period October 1,

5 (1) not to exceed \$20,000, may be expended for
6 the procurement of the services of individual consult-
7 ants, or organizations thereof (as authorized by sec-
8 tion 202(i) of the Legislative Reorganization Act of
9 1946 (2 U.S.C. 72a(i))); and

10 (2) not to exceed \$4,000, may be expended for
11 the training of the professional staff of such com-
12 mittee (under procedures specified by section 202(j)
13 of that Act).

15 2003.—For the period October 1, 2002, through February

24 the training of the professional staff of such com-

3 **SEC. 3. COMMITTEE ON ARMED SERVICES.**

4 (a) GENERAL AUTHORITY.—In carrying out its pow-
5 ers, duties, and functions under the Standing Rules of the
6 Senate, in accordance with its jurisdiction under rule XXV
7 of such rules, including holding hearings, reporting such
8 hearings, and making investigations as authorized by
9 paragraphs 1 and 8 of rule XXVI of the Standing Rules
10 of the Senate, the Committee on Armed Services is author-
11 ized from March 1, 2001, through February 28, 2003, in
12 its discretion—

13 (1) to make expenditures from the contingent
14 fund of the Senate;

15 (2) to employ personnel; and

16 (3) with the prior consent of the Government
17 department or agency concerned and the Committee
18 on Rules and Administration, to use on a reimburs-
19 able, or nonreimbursable, basis the services of per-
20 sonnel of any such department or agency.

21 (b) EXPENSES FOR PERIOD ENDING SEPTEMBER 30,
22 2001.—The expenses of the committee for the period

24 ers, duties, and functions imposed by section 105 of S.
25 Res. 4, agreed to February 4, 1977 (95th Congress), and

1 in exercising the authority conferred on it by that section,
2 the Committee on Indian Affairs is authorized from March
3 1, 2001, through February 28, 2003, in its discretion—

4 (1) to make expenditures from the contingent
5 fund of the Senate;

6 (2) to employ personnel; and

7 (3) with the prior consent of the Government
8 department or agency concerned and the Committee
9 on Rules and Administration, to use on a reimburs-
10 able, or nonreimbursable, basis the services of per-
11 sonnel of any such department or agency.

12 (b) EXPENSES FOR PERIOD ENDING SEPTEMBER 30,
13 2001.—The expenses of the committee for the period
14 March 1, 2001, through September 30, 2001, under this
15 section shall not exceed \$970,754, of which amount not
16 to exceed \$1,000, may be expended for the training of the
17 professional staff of such committee (under procedures
18 specified by section 202(j) of that Act).

19 (c) EXPENSES FOR FISCAL YEAR 2002 PERIOD.—
20 The expenses of the committee for the period October 1,
21 2001, through September 30, 2002, under this section
22 shall not exceed \$1,718,989, of which amount not to ex-
23 ceed \$1,000, may be expended for the training of the pro-
24 fessional staff of such committee (under procedures speci-
25 fied by section 202(j) of that Act).

1 (d) EXPENSES FOR PERIOD ENDING FEBRUARY 28,
2 2003.—For the period October 1, 2002, through February
3 28, 2003, expenses of the committee under this section
4 shall not exceed \$734,239, of which amount not to exceed
5 \$1,000, may be expended for the training of the profes-
6 sional staff of such committee (under procedures specified
7 by section 202(j) of that Act).

8 **SEC. 19. SPECIAL RESERVE.**

9 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—Within the funds in the ac-
10 count “Expenses of Inquiries and Investigations” appro-
11 priated by the legislative branch appropriation Acts for fis-
12 cal years 2001, 2002, and 2003, there is authorized to
13 be established a special reserve to be available to any com-
14 mittee funded by this resolution as provided in subsection
15 (b) of which—

16 (1) an amount not to exceed \$2,000,000, shall
17 be available for the period March 1, 2001, through
18 September 30, 2001; and

19 (2) an amount not to exceed \$3,700,000, shall
20 be available for the period October 1, 2001, through
21 September 30, 2002; and

22 (3) an amount not to exceed \$1,600,000, shall
23 be available for the period October 1, 2002, through
24 February 28, 2003.

1 (b) AVAILABILITY.—The special reserve authorized in
2 subsection (a) shall be available to any committee—

3 (1) on the basis of special need to meet unpaid
4 obligations incurred by that committee during the
5 periods referred to in paragraphs (1) and (2) of sub-
6 section (a); and

7 (2) at the request of a Chairman and Ranking
8 Member of that committee subject to the approval of
9 the Chairman and Ranking Member of the Com-
10 mittee on Rules and Administration.
