A BILL

To award a congressional gold medal to Jackie Robinson

(posthumously), in recognition of his many contributions to the Nation, and to express the sense of Congress that there should be a national day in recognition of Jackie Robinson.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. FINDINGS.**

4 Congress makes the following findings:

5 (1) Jackie Roosevelt Robinson was born on
6 January 31, 1919, in Cairo, Georgia, and was the
7 youngest of 5 children.

8 (2) Jackie Robinson attended the University of
9 California Los Angeles where he starred in football,
10 basketball, baseball, and track. His remarkable skills
11 earned him a reputation as the best athlete in Amer-
12 ica.

13 (3) In 1947, Jackie Robinson was signed by the
14 Brooklyn Dodgers and became the first black player
15 to play in Major League Baseball. His signing is
16 considered one of the most significant moments in
17 the history of professional sports in America. For
18 his remarkable performance on the field in his first
19 season, he won the National League's Rookie of the
20 Year Award.

1 (4) In 1949, Jackie Robinson was voted the
2 National League's Most Valuable Player by the
3 Baseball Writers Association of America.

4 (5) In 1962, Jackie Robinson was elected to the
5 Baseball Hall of Fame.

6 (6) Although the achievements of Jackie Robin-
7 son began with athletics, they widened to have a
8 profound influence on civil and human rights in
9 America.

10 (7) The signing of Jackie Robinson as the first
11 black player in Major League Baseball occurred be-
12 fore the United States military was desegregated by
13 President Harry Truman, before the civil rights
14 marches took place in the South, and before the Su-
15 preme Court issued its historic ruling in *Brown v.*
16 *Board of Education*, 347 U.S. 483 (1954).

17 (8) The American public came to regard Jackie
18 Robinson as a person of exceptional fortitude, integ-
19 rity, and athletic ability so rapidly that, by the end
20 of 1947, he finished ahead of President Harry Tru-
21 man, General Dwight Eisenhower, General Douglas
22 MacArthur, and Bob Hope in a national poll for the
23 most popular person in America, finishing only be-
24 hind Bing Crosby.

1 (9) Jackie Robinson was named vice president
2 of Chock Full O' Nuts in 1957 and later co-founded
3 the Freedom National Bank of Harlem.

4 (10) Leading by example, Jackie Robinson in-
5 fluenced many of the greatest political leaders in
6 America.

7 (11) Jackie Robinson worked tirelessly with a
8 number of religious and civic organizations to better
9 the lives of all Americans.

10 (12) The life and principles of Jackie Robinson
11 are the basis of the Jackie Robinson Foundation,
12 which keeps his memory alive by providing children
13 of low-income families with leadership and edu-
14 cational opportunities.

15 (13) The legacy and personal achievements of
16 Jackie Robinson, as an athlete, a business leader,
17 and a citizen, have had a lasting and positive influ-
18 ence on the advancement of civil rights in the United
19 States.

20 **SEC. 2. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL.**

21 (a) PRESENTATION AUTHORIZED.—The President is
22 authorized to present, on behalf of Congress, to the family
23 of Jackie Robinson, a gold medal of appropriate design
24 in recognition of the many contributions of Jackie Robin-
25 son to the Nation.

1 (b) DESIGN AND STRIKING.—For purposes of the
2 presentation referred to in subsection (a), the Secretary
3 of the Treasury (in this Act referred to as the “Sec-
4 retary”) shall strike a gold medal with suitable emblems,
5 devices, and inscriptions, to be determined by the Sec-
6 retary.

7 **SEC. 3. DUPLICATE MEDALS.**

8 Under such regulations as the Secretary may pre-
9 scribe, the Secretary may strike and sell duplicates in
10 bronze of the gold medal struck under section 2 at a price
11 sufficient to cover the costs of the medals, including labor,
12 materials, dies, use of machinery, and overhead expenses.

13 **SEC. 4. STATUS AS NATIONAL MEDALS.**

14 The medals struck under this Act are national medals
15 for purposes of chapter 51 of title 31, United States Code.

16 **SEC. 5. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

17 (a) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is
18 authorized to be charged against the United States Mint
19 Public Enterprise Fund an amount not to exceed \$30,000
20 to pay for the cost of the medal authorized under section
21 2.

22 (b) PROCEEDS OF SALE.—Amounts received from the
23 sale of duplicate bronze medals under section 3 shall be
24 deposited in the United States Mint Public Enterprise
25 Fund.

1 **SEC. 6. SENSE OF CONGRESS.**

2 It is the sense of Congress that—

3 (1) there should be designated a national day
4 for the purpose of recognizing the accomplishments
5 of Jackie Robinson; and

6 (2) the President should issue a proclamation
7 calling on the people of the United States to observe
8 the day with appropriate ceremonies and activities.

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
