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## A BILL

To require the Secretary of the Treasury to mint coins in commemoration of the centennial of the establishment of the Girl Scouts of the United States of America.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

2 This Act may be cited as the “Girl Scouts USA Cen-  
3 tennial Commemorative Coin Act”.

4 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

5 The Congress find as follows:

6 (1) The Girl Scouts of the United States of  
7 America is the world’s preeminent organization dedi-  
8 cated solely to girls where they build character and  
9 skills for success in the real world.

10 (2) In 1911, Juliette Gordon Low met Sir Rob-  
11 ert Baden-Powell, a war hero and the founder of the  
12 Boy Scouts.

13 (3) With Baden-Powell’s help and encourage-  
14 ment, Juliette Gordon Low made plans to start a  
15 similar association for American girls.

16 (4) On March 12, 1912, Juliette Gordon Low  
17 organized the first 2 Girl Scout Troops in Savannah,  
18 Georgia consisting of 18 members.

19 (5) Low devoted the next 15 years of her life  
20 to building the organization, which would become  
21 the largest voluntary association for women and girls  
22 in the United States.

23 (6) Low drafted the Girl Scout laws, supervised  
24 the writing of the first handbook in 1913, and pro-  
25 vided most of the financial support for the organiza-  
26 tion during its early years.

1           (7) The Girl Scouts of the United States of  
2 America was chartered by the United States Con-  
3 gress in 1950 in title 36, United States Code.

4           (8) Today there are more than 3,700,000 mem-  
5 bers in 236,000 troops throughout the United States  
6 and United States territories.

7           (9) Through membership in the World Associa-  
8 tion of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts, Girls Scouts of  
9 the United States of America is part of a worldwide  
10 family of 10,000,000 girls and adults in 145 coun-  
11 tries.

12           (10) More than 50,000,000 American women  
13 enjoyed Girl Scouting during their childhood—and  
14 that number continues to grow as Girl Scouts of the  
15 United States of America continues to inspire, chal-  
16 lenge, and empower girls everywhere.

17           (11) March 12, 2012 will mark the 100th Anni-  
18 versary of the Girl Scouts of the United States of  
19 America.

20 **SEC. 3. COIN SPECIFICATIONS.**

21           (a) \$1 SILVER COINS.—The Secretary of the Treas-  
22 ury (hereafter in this Act referred to as the “Secretary”)  
23 shall mint and issue not more than 350,000 \$1 coins in  
24 commemoration of the centennial of the Girl Scouts of the  
25 USA, each of which shall—

- 1           (1) weigh 26.73 grams;  
2           (2) have a diameter of 1.500 inches; and  
3           (3) contain 90 percent silver and 10 percent  
4 copper.

5           (b) **LEGAL TENDER.**—The coins minted under this  
6 Act shall be legal tender, as provided in section 5103 of  
7 title 31, United States Code.

8           (c) **NUMISMATIC ITEMS.**—For purposes of sections  
9 5134 and 5136 of title 31, United States Code, all coins  
10 minted under this Act shall be considered to be numis-  
11 matic items.

12 **SEC. 4. DESIGN OF COINS.**

13           (a) **DESIGN REQUIREMENTS.**—

14           (1) **IN GENERAL.**—The design of the coins  
15 minted under this Act shall be emblematic of the  
16 centennial of the Girl Scouts of the United States of  
17 America.

18           (2) **DESIGNATION AND INSCRIPTIONS.**—On  
19 each coin minted under this Act, there shall be—

20                   (A) a designation of the value of the coin;

21                   (B) an inscription of the year “2011”; and

22                   (C) inscriptions of the words “Liberty”,

23                   “In God We Trust”, “United States of Amer-  
24                   ica”, and “E Pluribus Unum”.

1 (b) SELECTION.—The design for the coins minted  
2 under this Act shall be—

3 (1) selected by the Secretary, after consultation  
4 with the Girl Scouts of the United States of America  
5 and the Commission of Fine Arts; and

6 (2) reviewed by the Citizens Coinage Advisory  
7 Committee.

8 **SEC. 5. ISSUANCE OF COINS.**

9 (a) QUALITY OF COINS.—Coins minted under this  
10 Act shall be issued in uncirculated and proof qualities.

11 (b) MINT FACILITY.—

12 (1) IN GENERAL.—Only 1 facility of the United  
13 States Mint may be used to strike any particular  
14 quality of the coins minted under this Act.

15 (2) USE OF THE UNITED STATES MINT AT  
16 WEST POINT, NEW YORK.—It is the sense of the  
17 Congress that the coins minted under this Act  
18 should be struck at the United States Mint at West  
19 Point, New York, to the greatest extent possible.

20 (c) PERIOD FOR ISSUANCE.—The Secretary may  
21 issue coins under this Act only during the calendar year  
22 beginning on January 1, 2011.

1 **SEC. 6. SALE OF COINS.**

2 (a) SALE PRICE.—The coins issued under this Act  
3 shall be sold by the Secretary at a price equal to the sum  
4 of—

5 (1) the face value of the coins;

6 (2) the surcharge provided in section 7 with re-  
7 spect to such coins; and

8 (3) the cost of designing and issuing the coins  
9 (including labor, materials, dies, use of machinery,  
10 overhead expenses, marketing, and shipping).

11 (b) BULK SALES.—The Secretary shall make bulk  
12 sales of the coins issued under this Act at a reasonable  
13 discount.

14 (c) PREPAID ORDERS.—

15 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall accept  
16 prepaid orders for the coins minted under this Act  
17 before the issuance of such coins.

18 (2) DISCOUNT.—Sale prices with respect to pre-  
19 paid orders under paragraph (1) shall be at a rea-  
20 sonable discount.

21 **SEC. 7. SURCHARGES.**

22 (a) IN GENERAL.—All sales of coins issued under this  
23 Act shall include a surcharge of \$10 per coin.

24 (b) DISTRIBUTION.—Subject to section 5134(f) of  
25 title 31, United States Code, all surcharges received by  
26 the Secretary from the sale of coins issued under this Act

1 shall be paid to the Girl Scouts of the United States of  
2 America for efforts involved in marking the Centennial  
3 which may include preservation efforts of the birthplace  
4 of Juliette Gordon Low.

5 (c) AUDITS.—The Comptroller General of the United  
6 States shall have the right to examine such books, records,  
7 documents, and other data of the Girl Scouts of the  
8 United States of America as may be related to the expend-  
9 itures of amounts paid under subsection (b).

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
