A BILL

To direct Federal agencies to donate excess and surplus Federal electronic equipment, including computers, computer components, printers, and fax machines, to qualifying small towns, counties, schools, nonprofit organizations, and libraries.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 *This Act may be cited as the “Federal Electronic*
5 *Equipment Donation Act of 2008”.*

6 **SEC. 2. REQUIREMENT TO TRANSFER USEFUL FEDERAL**
7 **ELECTRONIC EQUIPMENT TO EDUCATIONAL**
8 **RECIPIENTS.**

9 *(a) TRANSFER OF EQUIPMENT TO EDUCATIONAL EN-*
10 *TITIES.—*

11 *(1) IN GENERAL.—Each Federal agency shall*
12 *identify useful Federal electronic equipment that the*
13 *agency has determined is excess to its needs and—*

14 *(A) report such equipment to the Adminis-*
15 *trator of General Services for processing for*
16 *transfer to an educational recipient in accord-*

1 *ance with section 549 of title 40, United States*
2 *Code;*

3 *(B) transfer such equipment directly to an*
4 *educational recipient, through an arrangement*
5 *made by the Administrator of General Services*
6 *under subsection (b);*

7 *(C) transfer such equipment directly to an*
8 *educational recipient pursuant to section 11(i) of*
9 *the Stevenson-Wydler Technology Innovation Act*
10 *of 1980 (15 U.S.C. 3710(i)); or*

11 *(D) report such equipment to the Adminis-*
12 *trator of General Services as excess property if*
13 *transfer under subparagraphs (A) through (C) is*
14 *not practicable.*

15 (2) *MANAGEMENT OF NONTRANSFERABLE EQUIP-*
16 *MENT.—For equipment reported under paragraph*
17 *(1)(D), the Administrator of General Services shall*
18 *manage the equipment in accordance with sub-*
19 *chapters II and III of title 40, United States Code.*

20 (b) *ADVANCE REPORTING OF EQUIPMENT TO GSA.—*
21 *Each Federal agency shall report to the Administrator of*
22 *General Services the availability of useful Federal electronic*
23 *equipment as far as possible in advance of the date the*
24 *equipment is expected to become excess to its needs, so that*

1 *the Administrator may attempt to arrange for the direct*
2 *transfer from the donating agency to educational recipients.*

3 *(c) USE OF NONPROFIT REFURBISHERS.—In transfer-*
4 *ring any equipment pursuant to this Act, at the request*
5 *of the educational recipient and if appropriate, if the equip-*
6 *ment is not classroom-usable, the transferring agency shall*
7 *convey the equipment initially to a nonprofit refurbisher*
8 *for upgrade before transfer to the educational recipient.*

9 *(d) REMOVAL OF DATA BEFORE TRANSFER.—In*
10 *transferring any equipment pursuant to this Act, the trans-*
11 *ferring agency shall remove data from the equipment prior*
12 *to transfer to the educational recipient according to accept-*
13 *ed sanitization procedures. To the maximum extent prac-*
14 *ticable, the transferring agency shall remove data using a*
15 *means that does not remove, disable, destroy, or otherwise*
16 *render unusable the equipment or components.*

17 *(e) PREFERENCE.—In transferring any equipment*
18 *pursuant to this Act, the transferring agency shall give the*
19 *highest preference to educational recipients located in an*
20 *enterprise community or empowerment zone designated*
21 *under section 1391 or 1400 of the Internal Revenue Code*
22 *of 1986, a qualifying small town, or a qualifying county.*

23 *(f) LOW COST.—Any transfer made pursuant to this*
24 *Act shall be made at the lowest cost to the educational re-*
25 *ipient permitted by law.*

1 (g) *TITLE.*—*Title of ownership of equipment trans-*
2 *ferred pursuant to this Act shall transfer to the educational*
3 *recipient receiving the equipment.*

4 (h) *NOTICE OF AVAILABILITY OF EQUIPMENT.*—*The*
5 *Administrator of General Services shall provide notice of*
6 *the anticipated availability of useful Federal electronic*
7 *equipment to educational recipients by all practicable*
8 *means, including newspapers, community announcements,*
9 *and the Internet.*

10 (i) *FACILITATION BY REGIONAL FEDERAL EXECUTIVE*
11 *BOARDS.*—*The regional Federal Executive Boards (as that*
12 *term is used in part 960 of title 5, Code of Federal Regula-*
13 *tions) shall help facilitate the transfer of useful Federal elec-*
14 *tronic equipment from the agencies they represent to edu-*
15 *cational recipients under this Act.*

16 **SEC. 3. RULEMAKING.**

17 *The Administrator of General Services shall prescribe*
18 *rules and procedures to carry out this Act.*

19 **SEC. 4. EFFECT ON OTHER LAWS.**

20 *This Act supersedes Executive Order No. 12999 of*
21 *April 17, 1996.*

22 **SEC. 5. RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.**

23 *This Act may not be construed to create any right or*
24 *benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law by a*

1 *party against the United States or its agencies, officers, or*
2 *employees.*

3 **SEC. 6. DEFINITIONS.**

4 *In this Act:*

5 (1) *The term “Federal agency” means an Execu-*
6 *tive department or an Executive agency (as such*
7 *terms are defined in chapter 1 of title 5, United*
8 *States Code).*

9 (2) *The term “educational recipient” means a*
10 *school or a community-based educational organiza-*
11 *tion.*

12 (3) *The term “school” includes a pre-kinder-*
13 *garten program (as that term is used in the Elemen-*
14 *tary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), an ele-*
15 *mentary school, a secondary school, and a local edu-*
16 *cational agency (as those terms are defined in section*
17 *9101 of that Act.)*

18 (4) *The term “community based educational or-*
19 *ganization” means a nonprofit entity that qualifies*
20 *as a nonprofit educational institution or organization*
21 *for purposes of section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Rev-*
22 *enue Code of 1986 and—*

23 (A) *is engaged in collaborative projects, the*
24 *primary focus of which is education, with*

1 *schools, qualifying small towns, qualifying coun-*
2 *ties, or libraries; or*

3 *(B) provides use of computers and Internet*
4 *access to members of the community at no*
5 *charge.*

6 *(5) The term “qualifying small town” means a*
7 *political subdivision with a population of not more*
8 *than 24,999 individuals where 20 percent or more of*
9 *the residents earn less than the poverty threshold (as*
10 *defined by the Bureau of the Census).*

11 *(6) The term “qualifying county” means a coun-*
12 *ty where 20 percent or more of the residents earn less*
13 *than the poverty threshold (as defined by the Bureau*
14 *of the Census).*

15 *(7) The term “useful Federal electronic equip-*
16 *ment”—*

17 *(A) means—*

18 *(i) computers and related peripheral*
19 *tools (such as computer printers, modems,*
20 *routers, and servers), including tele-*
21 *communications and research equipment;*

22 *(ii) fax machines; and*

23 *(iii) any other electronic equipment de-*
24 *termined by a Federal agency to be poten-*

1 *tially useful to an educational recipient;*
2 *and*

3 *(B) includes computer software, where the*
4 *transfer of a license is permitted.*

5 *(8) The term “classroom-usable”, with respect to*
6 *useful Federal electronic equipment, means such*
7 *equipment that does not require an upgrade of hard-*
8 *ware or software in order to be used by an edu-*
9 *cational recipient without being first transferred*
10 *under section 2(c) to a nonprofit refurbisher for such*
11 *an upgrade.*

12 *(9) The term “nonprofit refurbisher” means an*
13 *organization that—*

14 *(A) is exempt from income taxes under sec-*
15 *tion 501(c) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986;*
16 *and*

17 *(B) upgrades useful Federal electronic*
18 *equipment that is not yet classroom-usable at no*
19 *cost or low cost to the ultimate educational re-*
20 *ipient.*

21 **SEC. 7. PREFERENCE IN DONATION OF PERSONAL PROP-**
22 **ERTY THROUGH STATE AGENCIES.**

23 *Section 549(e)(3)(B) of title 40, United States Code,*
24 *is amended—*

1 (1) *by striking “The state plan” and inserting*
2 *the following:*

3 “(i) *IN GENERAL.—The state plan*”;

4 *and*

5 (2) *by adding at the end the following new*
6 *clause:*

7 “(ii) *PREFERENCE.—The state plan of*
8 *operation shall require the state agency to*
9 *give the highest preference for electronic*
10 *equipment to eligible institutions (as de-*
11 *scribed in subsection (c)(3)) that are located*
12 *in an enterprise community or empower-*
13 *ment zone designated under section 1391 or*
14 *1400 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986,*
15 *a political subdivision with a population of*
16 *not more than 24,999 individuals where 20*
17 *percent or more of the residents earn less*
18 *than the poverty threshold (as defined by*
19 *the Bureau of the Census), or a county*
20 *where 20 percent or more of the residents*
21 *earn less than poverty threshold (as defined*
22 *by the Bureau of the Census).”.*

1 **SEC. 8. REPORT TO CONGRESS.**

2 (a) *REPORT REQUIRED.*—Not later than 18 months
3 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Adminis-
4 trator of General Services shall submit to Congress a report.

5 (b) *CONTENTS OF REPORT.*—The report shall contain
6 the following:

7 (1) *An inventory of items that Federal agencies*
8 *identified as useful Federal electronic equipment that*
9 *the agency has determined is excess to its needs in the*
10 *first 365 days after the date of the enactment of this*
11 *Act.*

12 (2) *The number of such items that were—*

13 (A) *transferred to educational recipients*
14 *pursuant to this Act;*

15 (B) *transferred to other Federal agencies*
16 *and organizations pursuant to section 521 of*
17 *title 40, United States Code;*

18 (C) *transferred to State agencies pursuant*
19 *to section 549 of title 40, United State Code; or*

20 (D) *disposed of through other means.*

21 (3) *Recommendations for further legislation or*
22 *administrative action that the Administrator con-*
23 *siders appropriate to establish an effective system for*
24 *transferring excess useful Federal electronic equip-*
25 *ment to educational recipients.*

Amend the title so as to read: “A bill to direct Federal agencies to transfer excess Federal electronic equipment, including computers, computer components, printers, and fax machines, to educational recipients.”.

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
