Submitted for your consideration is a request for FY 2004 budget amendments for the Department of Defense (DoD). The amendments in this transmittal would not affect the budgetary resources proposed in your FY 2004 Budget.

As described below and in more detail in the enclosures, the request amends the FY 2004 Budget to support the infrastructure necessary to execute changes in the U.S. defense strategy. In March 2003, the Secretary of Defense asked the Combatant Commanders to review the FY 2003 and FY 2004 military construction projects and recommend changes to support their changing priorities. Initial review has indicated that the military construction funding appropriated in FY 2003 and requested in FY 2004 should be amended to support changes in the overseas basing strategy. Funding requirements in Germany are reduced, funding requirements in Korea are reallocated, and funding for bases in the U.S. has been increased.

The attached proposal funds new construction projects totaling \$343 million in FY 2004. These increases are financed by rescinding \$153 million of funds appropriated in the FY 2003 Military Construction Appropriations Act, and deleting \$190 million for projects in the FY 2004 Budget, which no longer support the needs of DoD. The amendment also realigns \$108 million of FY 2000 and FY 2003 funds and \$105 million of FY 2004 funds for projects between various locations in the Republic of Korea.

- Military Construction, Army: The amendment would provide \$122 million for new FY 2004 requirements by rescinding \$66 million in FY 2003 and deleting \$56 million in FY 2004. The amendment also would realign \$181 million in FY 2000, FY 2003, and FY 2004 for construction projects within the Republic of Korea.

- Family Housing Construction, Army: The amendment would provide \$102 million for new FY 2004 requirements by rescinding \$52 million in FY 2003 and deleting \$50 million in FY 2004.

- Military Construction, Navy: The proposal would fund a new \$15 million requirement in FY 2004 by rescinding a like amount in FY 2003.

- Military Construction, Air Force and Family Housing Construction, Air Force: The amendment would provide \$78 million for new FY 2004 requirements by rescinding \$19 million in FY 2003 housing construction funds, deleting \$39 million in FY 2004 housing construction funds, and deleting \$20 million in FY 2004 military construction funds.

- Military Construction, Defense-Wide and Procurement, Defense-Wide: The proposal would provide \$26 million for a new FY 2004 construction project and for planning and design work by rescinding \$1 million in FY 2003 military construction project funds and deleting \$25 million from a FY 2004 procurement proposal. The amendment also would realign \$32 million in FY 2003 for a construction project within the Republic of Korea.

I have carefully reviewed this proposal and am satisfied that it is necessary at this time. Therefore, I join the Secretary of Defense in recommending that you transmit the proposed amendments to the Congress.

This proposal would amend the FY 2004 Budget request for the Military Construction, Defense-Wide appropriation to reflect current priorities of combatant commanders as a result of their recent review of infrastructure to support the execution of the U.S. defense strategy in the future. The proposed changes include a rescission of funds contained in the FY 2003 Military Construction Appropriations Act, realignment of a Korea project authorized and appropriated in FY 2003, and additional Planning and Design funds in FY 2004 to offset the project proposed for rescission.

The amendment also realigns funds between the Military Construction, Defense-Wide and Procurement, Defense-Wide appropriations to provide for the construction of a Special Operations Forces facility at MacDill Air Force Base, Florida. This facility is a crucial element in the U.S. Special Operations Command's (USSOCOM) ability to support the global war on terrorism. The USSOCOM will use this facility to effectively coordinate with the Secretary of Defense, the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the Combatant Commanders, its Theater Special Operations Commands, and USSOCOM Components to maintain operational readiness capability and to effectively prosecute the war on terrorism in the long run.

(In the appropriations language under the above heading, insert the following new provisions after Section 122.)

SEC. 123. Amounts appropriated for a military construction project at Camp Bonifas, Korea, relating to construction of a physical fitness center, as authorized by Section 130 of the Military Construction Appropriations Act, 2003 (Public Law 107-249), shall be available instead for a similar project at Camp Humphreys, Korea.

SEC 124. Amounts appropriated for four military construction projects at Camp Castle, Camp Hovey, Yongsan, and Seoul, relating to a physical fitness center, two barracks, and a middle school, respectively, as authorized by the Bob Stump National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2003 (Public Law 107-314), shall be available instead for similar projects at Camp Humphreys.

SEC. 125. None of the funds appropriated in this Act for the Department of the Army for military construction projects in the Republic of Korea may be obligated or expended for projects at Camp Humphreys in the Republic of Korea until the Secretary of Defense certifies and reports to the appropriate committees of Congress that the United States and the Republic of Korea have entered into an agreement on the availability and use of land sufficient for such projects.

The proposed Section 123 redirects construction of a physical fitness center, originally appropriated (\$4.0 million) in the FY 2000 Military Construction Appropriations Act for Camp Kyle, Korea, to Camp Humphreys, Korea. Section 130 of the FY 2003 Military Construction Appropriations Act approved the realignment of this project from Camp Kyle, Korea, to Camp Bonifas, Korea. However, the Commander of U.S. Forces, Korea, has determined that a further redirection of this project to Camp Humphreys is necessary. The scope and amount of funds related to this project do not change.

Similarly, as a result of recent reviews, the Army has determined that it is necessary to redirect the physical fitness center at Camp Castle, Korea; the barracks projects at Camp Hovey and K-16 Airfield, Korea; and the middle school replacement at Seoul, Korea, all authorized in the FY 2003 National Defense Authorization Act, to Camp Humphreys, Korea.

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In addition, this amendment realigns several Army military construction projects contained in the FY 2004 Budget for the Republic of Korea, from Camp Casey and Camp Hovey to Camp Humphreys, Korea. These projects are being sited on lands at Camp Humphreys that are not yet owned by the U.S. Government. However, negotiations are underway to purchase the necessary lands to construct these projects. Proposed general provision would require the Secretary of Defense to certify and report to the Congress that the United States and the Republic of Korea have entered into an agreement on the availability of land before constructing the projects.
